Hunt's Church Preschool www.huntscps.com Lent is just around the corner. Over the centuries, the church's understanding of lent has changed. Today, according to the church calendar, lent begins with Ash Wednesday and lasts forty days (not counting Sundays) to observing the events of Holy Week (Palm Sunday to Low Saturday). Theologically, lent is a time of preparation before Easter Day. Yet lent is a word which may seem incongruent to the way the world works in these following areas of life.

First, our western way of approaching things states that knowledge comes first and then comes the practice related to that knowledge. In other words, we get our '*Degree*' or '*Diploma*' first and then later come the actions.

Second, we live in a society that bases its advertising emphasis on the needs of its consumers. Thus we are bombarded with daily messages that encourage us to satiate our desires.

This second area leads us to the third area – nourishment. Nourishment is not just about satisfying our physical appetites. When Jesus is tempted in the wilderness, he says, "No one lives by bread alone."

Fourth, our society's norms tend to reinforce independence rather than interdependence.

In essence, the practice of lent is really about practicing disciplines that are counter-cultural. So how do we observe the season of Lent? I have constructed this acronym **(L-E-N-T)** to help us start the journey.

 $\begin{array}{l} \mathbf{L}-\text{Learning}\\ \mathbf{E}-\text{Emptying}\\ \mathbf{N}-\text{Nourishing}\\ \mathbf{T}-\text{Turning} \end{array}$ 

Lent is about learning: learning about ourselves, others, and the world. As people of the Christian faith, the practice of observing lent is vitally important for it's about learning how to follow Jesus and the path Jesus shows us. The Greek word *Disciple*' literally means 'to be a pupil of a teacher.' Jesus, as a teacher, never asked his disciples to take this class first and afterwards I will determine if you are fit for service. Jesus simply said, *"Come, follow me."* 

Lent is about learning the art of emptying ourselves. I am reminded of the seeker who goes to the Buddhist priest to inquire about the path of enlightenment. The seeker sits at the table across from the priest and begins asking all of his questions. As the priest is listening, he begins pouring tea into the seeker's cup. The traveling sojourner is shocked however when the priest keeps pouring the tea even when the tea cup is completely full. The tea begins to splash onto the table. The Buddhist priest then says, "Always remember the lesson of the overflowing tea cup. A full cup can never be filled."

Jesus teaches us the art of emptying ourselves. Jesus goes into the desert and there he is tempted. It is here Jesus empties himself: he empties himself of the ambition for political power, he empties himself of making economic security the pinnacle of his faith, he empties himself of the impulse to use religion as a way of manipulating others and God. In the book of Philippians, the Apostle Paul says of Jesus, "Christ Jesus, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God, as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a servant . . ." (Philippians 2:5-7a)

Lent is about finding nourishment for the soul. Someone once said, "The one who has no inner life becomes a slave to his or her surroundings." As we examine our culture, we realize that this maxim is vitally important. We are saturated with stories of violence. Many movies glorify gratuitous violence. Violent video games are created whereby the player becomes an active pursuer of violence. Whether it's violence or some other social issue in the world, you and I are called to be nourished in something greater than ourselves so that we can see the world and each other in a different way. The late Mother Theresa once said, "If we have no peace it is because we have forgotten we belong to one another."

Lent is about opening our lives to God's nourishing grace so that we are able to turn ourselves around. Repentance is a strange word for many of us today. Most of us assume we are always traveling the right way and thus we don't really need any course correction. We have been taught to be rugged individualists who can make it through life on our own. Yet Jesus teaches us that we are interdependent. He teaches us that we need each other and we need God.

The question that remains is this – how do we make a course correction. From a theological perspective, repentance means 'to turn around' or turn away from those things that separate us from God and from others. Generally speaking, the common definition of repentance is 'to feel remorse or contrition.' One contemporary theologian defines contrition in this tongue-and-cheek fashion: **Contrition (n.):** "The public display that follows getting caught."

Needless to say, repentance is a process we participate in without having as the pre-requisite the act of 'getting caught'. Self-examination is a continual process for each one of us. Observing lent helps us to see the church in a different way. As one pastor states: "The church is not a theological classroom. It is a conversion, confession, repentance, reconciliation, forgiveness, and sanctification center, where flawed people place their faith in Christ, gather to know and love him better, and learn to love others as he designed." I think that's a good way to see ourselves. As pastor of Hunt's, I invite us to observe a Holy Lent.



# Trustees Activity

Our first meeting in January was largely spent discussing the projects currently under way. Those projects include the Agapé basement renovation, scheduled work on the Agapé chimney and gutters on part of the church building (the more expensive gutter project will be later this spring), and the seemingly never-ending project of the new handicap door installed on VanMetre Hall. I keep telling myself that the long term benefits of having this door will outweigh the short term difficulty of getting it fully operational. At the time of this writing, the door has been repaired and is operating as expected. We are also happy to cross off recently completed projects from our list: new outside lighting, replacement of a concrete slab outside VanMetre Hall, other masonry repairs on both the church and Agapé, new doors with side windows on the nursery and 2's classroom, and 2 new exterior doors on the church building.

Turning toward the future, the Church Council approved the 2013 Operating budget at January's meeting. This budget has almost an 8% increase over 2012 but only a 6% increase over the 2012 actual income. In other words, Hunt's congregation outperformed the budget in 2012 - Thank you very much. The Trustees can account for a large portion of the increase of the expenses budgeted in two areas. The first is the large capital projects list we completed last year. That cost well above our capital funds balance, so we needed to borrow money. Not surprisingly, we had been experiencing mixed returns on our market investments, so we decided to borrow \$55,000 from ourselves and pay the cash back with interest over 7 years. Consider this one of my few capital campaign pleas: Anyone wishing to designate an extra contribution to the loan principle will be appreciated and also shorten the loan term. The second budget impact we requested is the conversion of our cleaning contractor to a 3/4 time custodial staff position. Neither of these additions was an easy decision, but this one proved more difficult. After many discussions at Trustees, PPRC, and Finance committee meetings and the Council meeting, we ultimately believe this change will allow us to be more responsive to many maintenance tasks by having someone onsite with more regular hours throughout the year. We also recognize that we are asking a lot from the congregation with these changes. With a little faith, we'll make it.

We spent some time at the January Finance meeting discussing the attraction to new families and some insight on what we do and why. A comment made during our discussion was of the many different ways people give, all of it is in the glory of God. The spectrum of the gifts we share includes service hours, money, friendliness, wisdom, devotion, visitation, and many other attributes often unconsidered. I have been on several committees over the years, and much like pledging a financial gift, committing to a committee term strikes fear in a lot of people. What if I can't fulfill the term? What do I know about \_\_\_\_? What can I contribute? What if I don't have the time? What if...? We all have these questions, and unless we take the first step, we'll never know the answer. Someone who just ended their term on Trustees believed that since they know very little about fixing things, they couldn't contribute value to the committee. What they offered was simply a different perspective, an opinion from a congregation member, and a helping hand on some projects. What they brought to the table was as invaluable as the skills brought by someone else. There is a committee whose job is to recruit people to serve on the church committees. They had a tough job last fall, and many committees still have vacancies. I don't know if anyone's ever suggested this, but try attending a committee meeting just to see what's going on. Other than the Staff-Pastor-Parish Relations Committee (SPPRC), all committees have an open invitation. Most meetings' dates and times are in the Sunday bulletin, and the meetings are typically either in the Adult Education room or Agapé. No commitment or specialization necessary, just an hour or so of your time. Try a couple different committees so by next fall you can officially join one.

**December/January Report** – **THANK YOU** to the congregation for your support and donations:

- \$1295 for the Advent Special Offering! This offering supports both the summer Sr. High Youth Group mission to repair homes in Western Maryland during Camp Hope and the Baltimore County Christian Workcamp during which homes are repaired throughout Baltimore County.
- \$495 for Child Fund International! This money helps Hunt's support five children abroad.
- > About 24 dozen cookies for the Earl's Place Resolution Run! Earl's Place, in Baltimore City, is a home for men recovering from substance abuse.

\$250 to date for The Wesley! This is a United Methodist organization that currently helps support eight residents at Springwell.
Some history provided by Gordon Fronk:
The Wesley was founded in 1867 by Dr. George C. M. Roberts and 24 Methodist Church ladies as a home for women who had become widowed by the casualties of the Civil War. In the 1930's, The Wesley moved to the campus at 2211 West Rogers Avenue in Mt. Washington MD, where it continued to serve the elderly who need some assistance in the activities of daily living.

In April 2008, the real property and substantially all the operating assets of The Wesley were sold and transferred to Age Wave Partners LLC, a for-profit limited liability company, which operates under the name of "Springwell Assisted Living Residence." However, The Wesley is continuing to fulfill its mission to the eight remaining residents who had entered The Wesley under the premise of life time care by paying for their costs of care out of contributions, gifts, bequests and income from the Milton Roberts Trust. The Wesley has been extraordinarily blessed to have received both great and small bequests and gifts from churches of the Baltimore-Washington Conference of the United Methodist Church and from individuals.

Casserole Ministry – Currently, fourteen members of the congregation are signed up to cook casseroles monthly according to a set recipe and freeze them, and they are delivered, along with those cooked by other area congregations, to an HIV-AIDS outpatient treatment center, a charter elementary school in an impoverished area of Baltimore, and a women's shelter. Child Fund International (assisting the schooling and living conditions of needy children throughout the world. Hunt's now sponsors five children.) – Some news: One of our sponsored children, Wandera Emmanuel, who had been our sixth child, has graduated from the CFI program as he is now 24 years old. According to the report we were sent, "While on program, Emmanuel and family members benefited from 3 female goats, trainings on animal rearing, child protection, savings, how to generate and manage income generating activities, safe water access, and received improved bean and maize seeds for planting and therefore had good yields and adequate food for the household throughout that were instrumental in improving the nutritional status of the child, supporting his other siblings in Education, general improvement in the life of the family thus putting a smile in all faces of the family members."
