Hunt's Church people stepped up once again with a home run effort in collecting and donating used sports equipment for underserved youths in Baltimore City. If a kid is playing sports, that's good. If a kid is coached well – that's great. She/he can take good habits learned and apply them to other parts of their life – like relationships, making good choices, and learning.

"We've always had kids asking to take a ball home to practice, but when you don't have a ball, obviously you can't do that. Now we can meet that need – and more." Toby Henson, coach, 13-15 team, James Mosher league.

As of May 15, we had collected:

Baseball and softball: 71 baseballs - 116 baseballs - 151 softballs - 76 gloves - 11 equipment

bags - 15 bases - 41 pairs of cleats - 15 pairs of other sport shoes - 29 batting helmets – Many baseball/softball pants/batting gloves - 8 hats – 7 complete sets of catcher's gear - Misc. other equipment, shirts

Lacrosse: 35 sticks - 4 helmets - 16 balls - 4 chest protectors - Misc. pads & gloves

Factoid: These aren't your father's bats! Bats now used in school sports cost <u>at least</u> \$150 – each. They have to be a certain compression and be certified if they are metal. Wooden bats are still acceptable but almost no team uses them. The ball does not go as far when hit and wood breaks. <u>Sports equipment is not cheap today.</u>

"CASSEROLE MINISTRY"

Salsa Chicken Rice Casserole

Ingredients

- 1 1/3 cups uncooked white rice
- **2 2/3 cups water**
- 4 skinless, boneless chicken breast halves
- 2 cups shredded Monterey Jack cheese
- 2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese
- 1 (10.75 ounce) can condensed cream of chicken soup
- 1 (10.75 ounce) can condensed cream of mushroom soup
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 1/2 cups mild salsa

Directions

- 1. Place rice and water in a saucepan, and bring to a boil. Reduce heat to low, cover, and simmer for 20 minutes.
- 2. Meanwhile, place chicken breast halves into a large saucepan, and fill the pan with water. Bring to a boil, and cook for 20 minutes, or until done. Remove chicken from water. When cool enough to handle, cut meat into bite-size pieces.
- 3. Lightly grease a 9x13 inch baking dish.
- 4. In a medium bowl, combine Monterey Jack and Cheddar cheeses. In a separate bowl, mix together cream of chicken soup, cream of mushroom soup, onion, and salsa. Layer 1/2 of the rice, 1/2 of the chicken, 1/2 of the soup and salsa mixture, and 1/2 of the cheese mixture in prepared dish. Repeat layers, ending with cheese.

Bake in an oven preheated to 350 for about 40 minutes, or until bubbly.

<u>30th Annual Baltimore County Christian Workcamp Answer Line</u> (of those often or infrequently asked questions)

How long has BCCW been based at Hunt's and with Hunt's as the host church?

BCCW originally was based at Grace-Falls Road UMC. However, due to the planned renovations of their hall, they could not do it for one year; consequently, ever since, it has been at Hunt's, which was more centrally located and had larger facilities. (Also, Grace-Falls Road has since closed.) The Answer Man had been wondering about the actual date for several years; but not until he had to review the archives for something else, was it found that the date was June 1992. This month marks 21 years meeting at Hunt's; this year's BCCW will be the 22nd one at Hunt's. **THANK YOU HUNT'S** for allowing us to use your facilities (including half of the garage for storage)!

How will the weather be that week?

Do you know with any certainty what the weather will be when you plan for your vacation? Being



in mid-July, it will most likely be hot, albeit the Answer Man remembers one time when he actually had to wear a jacket every morning. Last year there were some record high temperatures; however, that can be deceiving too. One volunteer after baking for two days said he had to beg off from working on the next day due to an expected 100++ degree day. The next day was >>100 degrees; but the one site was not only west of some very large deciduous trees, the actual work was also under a trailer roof, so it felt more like the high 80's.

There are those rare occasions also when the work is actually in an air conditioned house or building (but don't count on it!).

How are the work sites chosen?

Sometimes we do consider self-referrals; however, the strong preference is

suggestions/recommendations from social workers from the County Department of Social Services, nurses from the Department of Aging, food banks, churches, et. al., where there has already been some vetting of the owner or site. The sites are then visited, typically by one of our BCCW co-chairs or regional coordinators.

What type of work is needed to be done?

It depends on what type of work is requested by the residents for any particular year and whether



some groups have already reviewed the job listing and have "claimed" any sites. When there are large groups which want to stay together, they may "claim" a site before the week. Some years there can be a slew of ramps, whereas there may hardly be any in other years. But, potentially the work can be virtually anything that may be needed around one's house.

What skills are required?

The main one is the desire and willingness to work and help someone else. Skills and prior experience are useful; but, hopefully, there will always be someone at a site, such as crew chief, who knows what needs to be done and how to do it. Notwithstanding, those with skills in plumbing, electrical, carpentry, painting, roofing, masonry, etc. are especially welcomed.







What is the age requirement?

Anyone under the age of 16 needs to be paired with an adult, though not necessarily a parent. We have several octogenarians who work on sites; we have had children as young as 6 or 7 who have worked alongside their mothers.

Does BCCW provide service hours credit?

Depends. Some schools have given credit for work during BCCW, whereas others have not; as a result, you need to check with your school.

What is the time commitment?



You can work a few hours if that is all that you have available. Even though it is a week- long event, most volunteers do not work the full week. (The Answer Man began with one day in BCCW's year 1 or 2, then increased it after a few years to two days, then after a while to three days, and finally a full week, aided by the fact that he received an ample number of vacation days.)

Do you eat well?

Yes, you can if you want. (The Answer Man does!) At 7:30 am every morning at Hunt's, there is breakfast; the main entrée may vary from scrambled eggs to quiche to French toast to waffles/chipped beef to blueberry pancakes. Lunch is a choice of bread and lunch meat with a slew of snacks and more snacks, some of which are even healthy choices; these are laid out during breakfast at Hunt's for you to pack a lunch (Bring a cooler!). There is an assortment of drinks to keep you hydrated during the day. Optional dinners (6:30 pm Monday-Thursday and 7:00 pm on Friday) are at different churches, except for the 5:30 pm Sunday kick-off dinner which is at Hunt's. After Friday's dinner there is an "awards" ceremony and then a communion service.

Can you work with other members of Hunt's congregation?



Maybe; it depends. Does everyone agree on doing the type of work that is needed to be done and is there is a site that can handle the number of workers? However, it is also rewarding to work with other like- minded volunteers and meet new friends from other churches.

Do you have to stay/work at a site once you get there?

Unfortunately, this does come up on occasion. If a site is too gross or there are safety concerns or whatever makes you uneasy, the answer is NO; you are a volunteer and are free to say no. Hopefully, you would notify one of the BCCW leaders and ask for another site.







How do you register?

You can wait until the Sunday kick-off dinner or your first morning; or go to the website, print out a form, complete it beforehand, and give it to Steve Lippy. Registration fees are considered optional for Hunt's members since Hunt's donates monies to BCCW that are collected from half of the Advent and Lent offerings; so note that on the form.

Are there other ways, other than physically working at a work site, to help BCCW? **YES! YES! YES!** Some possibilities are as follows:

- Monetary contribution directly to BCCW [a 501 (c) 3 organization] or through Hunt's. BCCW is a 100% volunteer organization; monies are for supplies and materials during the week, as well as flyers, posters, etc.
- Donate used books, baked goods, or silent auction items for the auction that is held July 21 from about 5:00 pm-6:30 pm or so. You can attend the auction even if you do not volunteer to work during the week.
- Donate usable appliances, materials, etc.
- Assist in setting up tables and chairs in Van Metre Hall on Sunday July 21 after the 10:00 service.
- Donate baked goods (non-gooey), such as cookies and brownies, for lunch for the volunteers. Drop-off before Wednesday.
- Donate non-perishable food staples for those at the sites. **Drop-off before Wednesday.**
- Assist Jody Waters in preparing and serving the breakfast on Monday, July 22
- Pray for a safe and productive week.
- NEW for this year—buy a Boscov's 25% off coupon for \$5.00 to be used only on Tuesday October 22. Get one for yourself, your neighbors, your friends, your family, etc. This is a fundraiser opportunity which Boscov's is offering to various charities.

Can you do more than one of the above? YES! YES! YES!

Assistance Center of Towson Churches

Here is some exciting news from the Assistance Center of Towson Churches!

ACTC is expanding the building in which it serves the needy of Baltimore County. The groundbreaking was Saturday, May 18th, and I attended. It was a lovely ceremony with prayer, thanksgiving and support from local churches, businesses, organizations and politicians. There were commendations, proclamations and recognition for the volunteers and those others that assist with this valuable service to the needy in our county.

In 1985, a group of Towson ministers (14 churches) established a centralized helping center. Today, the supporting churches number 48 congregations and the original little white building is bursting at the seams. In a day and age when cutbacks are the norm, we find that the generosity of our community is stepping up to fill a gap.

In 2012,

- >33.770 people were helped
- >472,965 pounds of food were distributed
- >\$177,148 in financial assistance as given >6,745 homeless clients were helped





The center is more than the above. It is about listening and encouraging people who have lost all hope. It is about encouraging those that need someone positive in their lives. The center has a nurse practitioner, a mobile clothing unit, and the ability to help clients file for benefits online. The volunteers reach out to local stores to obtain fresh fruits and vegetables as a means to address growing concerns about poor health caused by inferior nutrition.

The Towson Rotary donated \$50,000 to support the expansion of the center. Carroll Engineering, Inc. did all the preliminary work to get a plan drawn and approved for the expansion. The first director of the center and her husband (Lindy and Charles Utermohle) gave a huge donation, and the labor and use of construction machinery for the project was donated by PTD Custom Builders, Inc. To me, it is amazing and quite a miracle.

Did I learn anything new on Saturday? Well, yes I did. I learned that one of our homeless clients sleeps in the bushes in the little garden behind Calvary Baptist Church.

The Kidder-Thomas Scholarship Fund resulted from generous bequests under the wills of Sam Kidder and Jean Thomas. The sum has been invested along with subsequent donations, and the income earned from this investment is for scholarships for "worthy students who are members of Hunt's Church."

Trustees of the Fund will consider applications for scholarship aid each year. There are three trustees that oversee the fund: Chair of the Church Council (Leigh Leonard), Chair of the Finance Committee (Nathan Derr), and Chair of the Board of Trustees (Ken Parrish).

Applications must be received by June 30, 2013.

Applications are available at the Church Office or from a member of the trustees listed above. The completed application should be submitted along with an official transcript of high school or college grades, preferably through the spring of the current year.

Scholarships are for undergraduate students enrolled full time (12 credits or more per semester), and graduate students enrolled part time or full time (6 credits or more per semester), in an accredited college or university in the United States.

In awarding scholarships, the Trustees will primarily consider the applicants':

- Academic merit
- Financial need
- Church involvement and activities
- Community involvement and leadership

Scholarship amounts will vary depending on the number of scholarships awarded each fall and the income earned from the investment principal. Generally, the awards will be in the range of \$500 to \$1,500.



Applicants must make an annual application for each year of full time undergraduate or part or full time graduate status.

Application Procedure

- 1. Applicants shall submit:
 - An official transcript (with raised seal stamped) of grades (high school or college) to the Hunt's Church Office, Attn: Scholarship Committee, <u>Non-Official copies of grades will not be</u> <u>accepted as transcripts</u>: it is the applicant's responsibility to get all materials to the committee on time.
 - b. A personal statement (one half to one page) from the student briefly describing his/her activities of church and community involvement and leadership during the past two years.
