friendliness, wisdom, devotion, visitation, and many other attributes often unconsidered. I have been on several committees over the years and have found that joining a committee unnecessarily strikes fear in a lot of people. What if I can't fulfill the term? What do I know about [finance, business, human resources, fixing things, teaching, education,

worship services, cooking, missions, etc]? What can I contribute? What if I don't have the time? What if...? We all have these questions, and unless we take the first step, we'll never know the answer. Someone who ended their term on Trustees last year believed that since they know very little about fixing things, they couldn't contribute value to the committee. What they offered was simply a different perspective, an opinion from a congregation member, and a helping hand. What they brought to the table was equally valuable as the trade skills brought by someone else. The same goes for the finance committee, education committee, pastor-parish relations committee, or any other committee that allows this church to operate. Interest in helping Hunt's succeed is the only requirement for committee membership; particular skills are a bonus offering. Some people get on committees that differ from their day job, just for a change of pace. Some committees meet monthly and others quarterly. No specialization is necessary, just an hour or so of your time. There are several committees that are coming up short on volunteers. Please reconsider if you've turned down a request or step forward if you haven't been approached. It's in everybody's best interest to have functional committees. New faces allow the old ones to try something else.

The Trustees have several projects in the works. Our "Fall Work Day" was October 26. A great group of 17 people came out Saturday morning and helped clean up and work on some special projects. The appearance of our property is often the first impression for visitors and can be the only impression for passersby. Thank you to Pat Barkdoll, Merle Bayne, Tim Bosley, Nathan Derr, Dan Funderburk, Ann Gallant, Glenn Keatts, Linda Keatts, Steve Lippy, DeWitt Lott, Monty Messersmith, Ken Parrish, Becky Pauliny, Ron Peterson, Susan Schubert, Cynthia Sparks, Robert Sparks, and Dave Young for your time. A special thanks goes to Linda, Becky, and Cynthia who worked on the applesauce crew first and then came out to help with our projects.

Workday projects included leaf clearing, tree trimming, tree removal, cleaning the Agapé House's cellar-way drain, replacing parking lot light bulbs, and replacing one stain glass window light bulb. Ron Peterson is still looking for people to join the Grounds Committee, and he promises that no green-thumb is required. In fact, he said it's a good place to either hone your skills for working around your house or simply to avoid working around your house. Other projects we've been tackling are the repair of the hallway floor leading to the kitchen and the replacement of the convection oven in the kitchen. The gutters around the church building continue to be a problem and we hope to select a suitable contractor to replace the gutters and trim with maintenance-free products. The work at the Agapé House seems to be paying off, as the recent rainfalls have resulted in very little water in the basement and in the 2nd floor meeting room. Perhaps over the winter, reconstruction of the basement can begin and it will become a functional meeting room once again.

"Casserole Ministry"

Recipe: Salsa Chicken Rice Casserole

Due Date: November 6th

Ingredients

1 1/3 cups uncooked white rice

2 2/3 cups water

4 skinless, boneless chicken breast halves

2 cups shredded Monterey Jack cheese

2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese

1 (10.75 ounce) can condensed cream of chicken soup

1 (10.75 ounce) can condensed cream of mushroom soup

1 onion, chopped

1 ½ cups mild salsa

Directions


- 1. Place rice and water in a saucepan, and bring to a boil. Reduce heat to low, cover, and simmer for 20 minutes.
- 2. Meanwhile, place chicken breast halves into a large saucepan, and fill the pan with water. Bring to a boil, and cook for 20 minutes, or until done. Remove chicken from water. When cool enough to handle, cut meat into bite-size pieces.
- 3. Lightly grease a 9x13 inch baking dish.
- 4. In a medium bowl, combine Monterey Jack and Cheddar cheeses. In a separate bowl, mix together cream of chicken soup, cream of mushroom soul, onion, and salsa. Layer ½ of the rice, ½ of the chicken, ½ of the soup and salsa mixture, and ½ of the cheese mixture in prepared dish. Repeat layers, ending with cheese.
- 5. Cover and freeze for delivery.
- 6. Please attach the following label:

Salsa Chicken Rice Casserole

Ingredients: white rice, water, chicken breasts, Monterey Jack cheese, Cheddar cheese, cream of chicken soup, cream of mushroom soup, onion, mild salsa

Let defrost in the fridge for 24 hours.

Bake in an oven preheated to 350 degrees for about 40 minutes, or until bubbly.

Missions Focus for NOVEMBER – Food to the hungry in our community

Please bring in your bags filled with food for Thanksgiving by Sunday, November 17. These will be delivered to the **Assistance Center of Towson Churches (ACTC)** for distribution to the needy in our community.

There are two options:

1) **(Preferred) - Purchase one or more pre-packed Thanksgiving "baskets"** from grocery stores in the area for a reasonable price. There are four grocery stores participating in the ACTC Thanksgiving Basket Drive which makes it very easy to participate! These pre-packed bags will be available starting on Nov. 1 at each of the stores listed and can be picked up at the Customer Service counter for \$23. This also includes a reusable bag. If you are picking up more than a few bags, please call in advance.

Mars Supermarket, Timonium (at the intersection of York and Ridgely Roads)

ShopRite, Timonium (37 Aylesbury Rd.)

Giant Supermarket, Timonium (across from the fairgrounds)

Giant Supermarket, Towson (across from the Drumcastle Center)

2) Pack your own reusable grocery bag including all or some of the following items:

1 can sweet potatoes/yams (23-29oz can)

2 cans meat/main dish (example: beef stew or chili-15-24oz cans)

1 large can fruit (20-30oz can)

4 cans vegetables (example: green beans, peas or corn-15oz cans)

1 cranberry sauce

2 pkg. macaroni & cheese

1 box instant mashed potatoes

1 cake or brownie mix

1 bag or box of stuffing mix

1 lb. bag or box of rice

(PLEASE DO NOT PUT MONEY OR GIFT CARDS IN BAGS.)

Tips for Packing:

- 1. Please use a reusable grocery bag.
- 2. Pack large cans on bottom & lighter items on top.
- **3.** Mark bags as **COMPLETE** or **INCOMPLETE** (list what is missing).

Please note: You can bring your Thanksgiving food bags any Sunday starting November 3 and put them in the coat closet. You can also bring them during the Turkey Dinner. For transportation purposes, we would like to get as many as possible early, but the <u>deadline is Sunday, Nov. 17</u>.

The **November Special Offering** is for ACTC.

Missions News –

Six volunteers from Hunt's Church will be serving a meal to the homeless at <u>Manna House</u> in Baltimore on Saturday morning, November 2.

The dates for the next **Baltimore County Christian Workcamp** have been decided: July 20-25, 2014.



The Baltimore Region Fall Meeting for the **Board of Child Care Auxiliary** was attended by Steve & Mary Ellen Lippy. As with many organizations, the Board of Child Care Auxiliary is hurting for volunteers to lead the district. (President, 1st and 2nd Vice Presidents) Also, the Auxiliary is always looking for volunteers for specific projects, many of which are for short durations. Some of these, if you are so inclined **after** supporting Hunt's annual projects like the ACTC baskets and Shoe Box gifts, include the following:

- Donations for their Thanksgiving baskets, including monetary donations for hams. These items are due November 25.
- Assembling the baskets on November 14 at BCC.
- Donations for their Christmas Store at which the children are able to buy gifts for their family at a very nominal cost. See the Missions bulletin board for possible gift items, most of which are different from the Mid-High project. These are needed by November 25.
- Staffing the Christmas Store at BCC November 29-30.
- Helping with the Christmas party on December 14.
- Baking cookies, probably in February. (More info will follow in subsequent Point issues.)
- Helping with Easter baskets.

If anyone is interested in getting email information directly from BCC or going on a tour to see the BCC campus in Randallstown, let Steve or Mary Ellen know. The Auxiliary's goal is to provide "extras," including unconditional love, to these children at BCC, many, if not most, of whom have severe emotional problems due to their difficult and troubled home lives.



The Missions Committee is an Ad Hoc committee made up of volunteer members, in contrast to individuals recruited and appointed to other church committees. As such, we would like to develop a <u>list of people</u> who are potentially interested in participating in mission projects, but who do not necessarily attend our regular meetings. Washington UMC Conference on mission trips. This is such a personally rewarding program that many say that once they participate, they go again (and again) as it is so worthwhile and beneficial.


UNITED METHODIST VOLUNTEERS IN MISSION

These VIM trips are similar to what the Baltimore County Christian Workcamp does. Many times they involve follow-up

restoration work related to natural disasters like hurricanes or constructing new facilities that are needed, such as a one-room clinic or chapel.

Often the churches organizing these VIM trips, which can be local (e.g., Crisfield, MD), out-of-state (e.g., New Jersey, North Carolina, Louisiana, Mississippi), or out-of-country (e.g., Nicaragua, Costa Rico, Russia), need additional volunteers to augment their teams and will advertise their need for more volunteers.

If you believe you might have an interest in doing a VIM trip sometime and either (1) wish to be notified of any opportunities to tag along with a VIM trip organized by another church and/or (2) would be interested in participating in a Hunt's organized VIM trip, let Melissa know. Then we will let you know if (1) we hear of any openings and/or (2) keep your name on file in case someone at Hunt's wants to organize a trip in the future.
