Dear Friends,

Someone once said, *"Choose your words carefully because someday you might have to eat them."* Have you ever said something that you wished you could take back? Have you ever apologized to another person for words you may have used? I dare say that we've all used words that have gotten us into trouble.

As a pastor, I am constantly struggling for the right words to say, the right way to say them and for the right time to share them. Not an easy task! I like the story about the minister who got up in the pulpit one Sunday morning with a large band-aid on his face. He told his congregation before he gave his sermon that he *'cut his face while thinking about his sermon.'* After the service, one of his parishioners met the minister at the door and said, *"Reverend, next week why don't you think about your face and cut your sermon."* Ouch! It's not always easy to share the right words.

Proverbs 18:21 says, *"Words kill, words give life; they're either poison or fruit – you choose."* Here the psalmist makes it quite clear – the words we use have consequences. Words impact others – either positively or negatively.

That's an important principle to keep in mind as we begin a busy fall in the life of our congregation. Let me be the first to follow this principle as I share a few words about several ministries at our church.

We will be resuming Sunday school soon. Teachers are needed. To be in compliance with our **Safe Sanctuary Policy**, we are asking all volunteers and staff members who work with children, youth, and vulnerable adults to undergo background checks and fingerprinting. The church will cover the cost of the procedure. Even though we believe that the people of Hunt's are people of integrity, strong values, and above reproach, we are following this new procedure to ensure a safe environment for all people (young, elderly, and in-between) to come and learn about God and to grow in their faith. As your pastor, I often tell people in our community that Hunt's church is a great place to serve and that we are blessed to have so many wonderful people who make up the congregation.

We have been so fortunate to have Mary Margaret Mack, Cara Ehrlich and Nancy Kennedy provide direction and oversight to our Educational Program. I think this is one of our greatest strengths in reaching new people and encouraging people to walk the way of Jesus – the way of service to others. Mary Margaret, Cara, and Nancy have collectively offered 60 years of service to this endeavor. I encourage you to send them a word of appreciation for all that they have done and continue to do to enhance our program.

#### 30<sup>th</sup> Annual Baltimore County Christian Workcamp (BCCW) Summary

Another SUCCESSFUL and PRODUCTIVE week assisting limited income families in Baltimore County! If the weather from Monday July 22-Friday July 26 was not the best we ever had for a BCCW week, it certainly was in the top three, as it was not too hot, not too humid, and no rain during the day.

Several Hunt's "records" or "first's" were set:

- Most number of volunteers in the week--11
- Most number of volunteers who worked all week--4
- Most number of total days worked--38
- First time for a full Hunt's team for all week (albeit we merged with another team Thursday and Friday, and had some others whom we "accepted" onto our team)
- Due to the large number of volunteers, three Hunt's members were "offered" to a ramp team which had a crew chief but no workers, and they had a great time

At a site in Essex, the Hunt's team designed, purchased the materials, and built a 46' ramp, which included two 3' x 3' landings, a "unique" gate fabricated by Hunt's crew chief Glenn Keatts, as well as steps off one of the landings. On Friday night at our annual BCCW "awards" ceremony, Hunt's received the "dubious" honor of the most expensive ramp for the week, presumably due to it being the longest one and having a gate and steps. In addition, at this site, we replaced a 13+' section of gutter and fascia board, one end of which was on the ground and the other still attached to the house, and cleaned out the gutters. This project took three days and about half an hour on Thursday; after which, we went to a site in Edgemere and built a 45' ramp in less than  $1\frac{1}{2}$  days in conjunction with a smaller ramp team.

Besides the Regans (Melissa, Rebecca, and Christopher) who were "farmed" off to the other ramp team, the following worked one or more days on the Hunt's team: Merle Bayne, Pat Barkdoll, Linda Keatts, Glenn Keatts, Steve Lippy, Diane Paulson, Gary Sheffield-James, and Robert Sparks. Many thanks is extended to Glenn, who was the crew chief, and to Robert, who hauled all of the lumber for the ramp. Additionally, Robert provided a ladder, a saw table, and a canopy. Besides having great weather, Glenn said the Italian ice was "delicious" as on two days we received a treat of ices and popsicles from the "Italian ice lady." Glenn's reflections also include: "I really enjoyed working with our group from Hunt's and I think we did great work too. I encourage everyone to try this because I think they will find it very satisfying. Looking forward to next year!" [That's what we like to hear; that a crew chief will be returning.]

In addition to those who volunteered to work building ramps, thanks to all those who supported BCCW through giving to the Advent and Lenten offerings, as well as special donations; set up tables and chairs on Sunday; brought items to be auctioned off or sold; attended the auction, et. al. Also, thanks to Jody Waters, who bought the food and coordinated the BCCW breakfast on Monday and to those who helped prepare the breakfast: Merle Bayne, Esther Cohen and her friend George, Carol Highfield, Leigh Leonard, Mary Ellen Lippy, Ellie Lott, and Susan Schubert.

Boscov's 25% coupons for October 22 are still available for a donation to BCCW of \$5.



Have you ever thought about the following: We can get anything we want, from anywhere in the world, whenever we want it. That's how it is and that's how we want it to be. Still, our lives aren't any different than other generations before us. Our time is. We want spiritual direction, but it has to be real for us and available when we need it. We want a new format for getting Christian perspectives. NOOMA is the new format. It's short films with communicators that really speak to us. (Most of the commentary is done by Rob Bell.) Compact, portable, and concise. Each NOOMA touches on issues that we care about, that we want to talk about, and it comes in a way that fits our world. It's a format that's there for us when we need it, as we need it, how we need it.

The Adult Sunday School class will be discussing a series of lessons based on the DVD's produced by NOOMA. Each DVD runs approximately 10 - 12 minutes. After each DVD is finished there is a series of questions related to the subject of the DVD.

A brief description of a few of the topics covered by the lessons include:

- **Rain** Things don't always work out the way we want them to, or the way we think they will. Sometimes we don't even see it coming.
- **Sunday** Why do we do the things we do? Why do we go to church or give money away? Because we're supposed to or because we think God needs it?
- **Kickball** We always think we know what's missing from our lives in order to really make us happy, don't we?
- **Bullhorn** God loves everyone, so a Christian should too.

**She** We didn't have anything to do with our birth. We are all here because some woman somewhere gave us life. Her pain, her effort, for our life. And when a mother gives like that to a child, she is showing us what God is like.



#### **JOURNEY THROUGH THE BIBLE**



*Journey Through the Bible* is a long term approach to studying the Bible and highlights pivotal points in the Scripture, lifting up the Bible's most significant stories, themes, events, and people. During each session we will cover four dimensions.

- **Dimension 2** provides historical information and helps us glean insights into what the passage meant for its first readers.

#### Assistance Center of Towson Churches (ACTC) renovation and expansion

The ACTC, a local mission's project which Hunt's has supported for many years with food

collections and financial supported for many years with food collections and financial support, is remodeling and expanding its building in the heart of Towson, next to Calvary Baptist Church, in order to better serve its clientele. They are using **volunteer** <u>labor</u>, assisted by a general contractor, a member of Timonium UMC, who is donating his time and expertise! Virtually every Saturday (but not necessarily all) and normally one day per week (presently Thursday, but not necessarily all) until the project is completed (hopefully by the end of October). Volunteers gather about 8:00-8:30 a.m. at the site. **They are seeking volunteers, either skilled or helpers**. Of course, they would prefer a commitment, albeit they are excited to see any volunteers (new or returning). Starting in September, they anticipate working on Tuesdays too.



The more volunteers the sooner the ACTC building will be completed and the sooner the ACTC can be functioning better, as ACTC operations are in temporary quarters now. The work site is limited in size and there is a max number of volunteers which can feasibly work at any one time, albeit there have been only eight to eleven volunteers when I have worked (from the 48 or so churches which support ACTC and not all of the volunteers have even been members of those churches). The existing building is completely gutted and one end of the addition is framed. When I have been there, the following have been done: broken cinder block and brick, and wood from demolition work, loaded into a roll-off container; wood siding, removed off the existing building; soffit board (but not the fascia), removed; cinder block courses, a concrete pad, and interior wood framing, demolished; an electric panel, moved; wall and window framing, fabricated to be eventually installed; forms for a concrete pour, placed; concrete footers for a cinder block wall, poured; and then the forms, removed; OSB, nailed on the walls for the new siding; rows of block courses, installed; etc. Unfortunately, the scope of the renovation expanded with the discovery of termite damage which necessitated more demolition of the existing building than initially envisioned.

On Saturdays, lunch is typically provided in the church basement (for the past three Saturdays, a very good lunch too); an on-site refrigerator has bottles of water and drinks. On Thursdays, the volunteers go to lunch nearby with ACTC picking up the tab for sandwiches. Parking is free, though limited.

This is like the Baltimore County Christian Workcamp (BCCW), but sans breakfast and making a bagged lunch at Hunt's, as well as not having to travel throughout the County to help residents; but this ACTC mission's project is also using volunteers to save monies in order to be able to help more of those who are less fortunate. Therefore, if you missed the chance to participate in BCCW or, even if you did, volunteer a day to help the ACTC. The work projects will vary from week to week as work progresses, which means, unless one knows what happened the previous work day, a volunteer does not know what type of tools to take, though there are normally ample tools on-site.
