Friends:

What does it mean to observe a Holy Lent? Lent has not become a secularized holiday. The commercial world would probably have a hard time marketing the season of Lent to the general public in terms of buying and selling. While businesses and retailers over the years have been able to carve out an established buying clientele with holidays such as Christmas and Easter in using marketing icons as Santa Claus and the Easter Bunny, I don't observe any marketing of the season of Lent. We know that a few weeks before Lent we can go to the bakery and pick up those delicious hot cross buns — which I think are very tasty. Other than that, I can't think of much else.



The season of Lent which emphasizes self-denial, prayer, fasting, meditation, and almsgiving doesn't lend itself to being a big ticket item for a consumer culture.

With that being said, you and I have been so conditioned by an economic system that defines us as consumers that we may seek to observe Lent by focusing on ourselves. Mark Galli wrote an insightful article in **Christianity Today** entitled, "Giving up Self-Discipline". Below is an excerpt from that article.

Lent is supposed to have more spiritual overtones than mere self-improvement mantras of New Year's. But I suspect that for many Of us, Lenten disciplines are more about us than about God. More about getting our act together in some area that continually discourages us and repeatedly sabotages our self-respect. The advantage of Lent over New Year's resolutions is that we can bring God on our side, and the whole church is there to cheer us on. But for many of us, I suspect, it's one big self-improvement regimen, with God as mere personal coach.

Lent is not so much an inward focus about us as it is an outward focus toward God and God's call on our lives. In the Gospels, we read about Jesus being led by God's Spirit into the wilderness to fast. While there for forty days, he was tempted to use his authority to serve himself — by amassing political, economic, and religious power. The Tempter was saying in effect to Jesus, "This can be all about you." Jesus rejected the way of power and self-aggrandizement by dedicating his life to the way of service to God and to others. In following Jesus, we are able to know the true meaning of a Holy Lent — that life, real life, begins when we move outside of ourselves.

One Great Hour of Sharing has been an ecumenical effort since 1949 to collect money to assist those in need.

Some Missions at Hunt's Memorial United Methodist Church

Assistance Center of Towson Churches (ACTC) – Hunt's participates in this ecumenical program, supported by 48 churches and other organizations and based at Calvary Baptist Church in Towson, to help provide food and emergency assistance to the needy and homeless in our community.

Baltimore County Christian Workcamp - The task of the BCCW is "to share the love of Christ by repairing the homes of some limited income families in Baltimore County," primarily during the third week in July. BCCW is led by lay people and is an ecumenical group, which represents between 30 and 40 churches of many different denominations. Each year 150-250 volunteers work to repair 40-60 homes throughout the County.

Board of Child Care – The BCC is an outreach ministry of the Baltimore-Washington Conference of the United Methodist church which serves children and families who require physical, emotional, behavioral and social support. Programs include residential care, foster care, early childhood education, therapeutic counseling, adoption services, and special education. Hunt's offers financial support, provides cookies for the children (in February), and collects Box tops/Labels for Education year round.

Camp Hope – The Hunt's Senior High Youth Group joins other youth groups for one week each summer to repair homes of limited income families in western Maryland.

Campus Crusade (Cru) – Hunt's helps support Jeff and Lisa Highfield who are on-campus missionaries at Virginia Tech. See their monthly report on the Missions bulletin board downstairs.

Casserole Ministry - As participants in a county-wide mission, members of Hunt's cook casseroles according to a set recipe and freeze them, and they are delivered to an HIV-AIDS outpatient treatment center, a charter elementary/middle school in an impoverished area of Baltimore, and a women's recovery transitional housing program.

Child Fund International – Hunt's sponsors five children abroad, assisting with their education and living conditions and providing gifts for their birthdays and at Christmas.

Christmas Present Project – The Hunt's mid-highs coordinate the collection and delivery of shoeboxes filled with gifts to every child at several elementary schools in impoverished areas of Baltimore City.

Earl's Place – Hunt's supports Earl's Place, a transitional housing program which provides affordable housing and supportive services to formerly homeless men who are recovering from substance abuse, with casseroles, sub sandwiches for the Super Bowl, and homemade cookies for their January 1 Resolution Run fundraiser.

Manna House – Hunt's members help serve a meal to the homeless in Baltimore City several times a year.

Missionary – Hunt's Church sponsors Nan McCurdy, a UM missionary working with women in Nicaragua.

Tutoring students from Frederick Douglass High School (Baltimore City) – Hunt's members tutor students to help them pass their required HSA exams or "Bridge Projects" so they can graduate from high school.

United Methodist Committee on Relief – As there is need, Hunt's provides financial assistance to UMCOR's special relief efforts to alleviate human suffering arising out of such disasters as hurricanes and earthquakes.

The Wesley Home - Hunt's financially assists with the costs for seven senior citizens who live at this facility, now named Springwell, on West Rogers Avenue in Baltimore City.

THE CASSEROLE MINISTRY'S MARCH RECIPE


Texas Panch Chicken Casserole**

Ingredients:

- 1 large onion chopped
- 2 celery ribs chopped
- 1 medium green pepper chopped
- 1 medium sweet red pepper chopped
- 1 tablespoon canola oil
- 1 garlic clove
- 3 cups cooked chicken cubes
- 1 can cream of celery soup
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 can (10 oz.) diced tomatoes & green chilis undrained
- 1 tablespoon chili powder
- 12 corn tortillas cut into one inch strips
- 2 cups (8 oz.) shredded cheddar cheese divided



In a large non-stick skillet coated with cooking spray... Sauté onion, celery, and peppers in oil until crisp & tender Add garlic - Then cook one minute longer Stir in chicken, soups, tomatoes & green chilis, and chili powder



Repeat layers

Bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 30-35 minutes or until bubbly

Cool and freeze




Texas Ranch Chicken Casserole
