õI am playing fantasy footballö ó there, Iøve said it. My son put together 12 teams before the regular season and wanted me to participate. I said õYes.ö Currently, my rank is 6th place. I dongt know why that is so. Iøm still learning. Iøve also learned itøs rather time-consuming. I didnøt participate in the draft to pick certain players. The computer pre-selected my players for me. Since I work on Sundays, I canøt make roster changes just before kickoff. Yet, Iøm in sixth place and I donøt understand why. In fact, I am not even sure how I have earned points, even though my son has tried his best to help me understand.

What I do understand, however, is that Iøm not playing in a real game. Iøm counting on the real players to play well on game day so as to boost my score. Iøm quick to surmise that fantasy football is just that ó itøs a fantasy for me. Itøs not real football.

As of late, the National Football League has been under great scrutiny and media attention in facing real-life issues, such as intimate partner abuse, child abuse and drug abuse. So many questions are being asked. Why has the league been content to sweep these issues under the rug for many years but only now is seeking to do something to address these concerns? Is there a uniform standard to address these concerns for all parties involved? What constitutes fairness in terms of protecting oneon individual rights and yet ensuring whaton good for society at large? Many of us are asking these questions, along with others, at the office water-cooler, in our homes, and in our many contacts with people through the week. Many have strong opinions because the issues touch a myriad of issues of family, parenting and discipline, work, the rights of children, legal rights under the law, unions and a host of others. Whatever our various opinions may be, these questions still need to be addressed and responded to.

So here I am, playing fantasy football in a real world of complexities, problems, and concerns of how to face social issues of great magnitude. After Sunday, I will look on my I-phone to check my score ó a score I received without even playing on the field. You see, there is a difference between fantasy and reality.

I hope we never develop a game called õFantasy Churchö, where the church is viewed as a game played on the sidelines, a place where we show up and try to get brownie points from God. A place where the sermon is delivered, where the choir anthem is sung, and where the scriptures are read and then we leave. In the week ahead, we wonder how these things apply to the real world.

Fantasy church is not going to happen because we live in the real word. We live in a real world where people get sick and need care. We live in a real world where churches have budgets and bills need to be paid. We live in a real world where young children are looking for nurture, guidance, and something to believe in. We live in a real world where poor people live in houses that are in need of repair. In this real world, we dongt sit passively on the sidelines. In this real world, we become engaged in wise and generous stewardship, spend time visiting the sick, offer ourselves to be teachers to help children learn, volunteer to participate in a mission event or trip, and much more.

Yes, I am playing fantasy football. Yet I thank God that I serve in a real church that seeks to address real needs. I thank God that I serve a real church where we believe in entering the fray of life rather than sitting on the sidelines. Sunday is coming and Iøm playing fantasy football, but I am ready for real church.

## Emeril Lagasse® Better Than Mama's Chili Mac

- **Yield:** 6 to 8 servings
- Use 1 9 X 13 casserole or cut recipe in half to use an 8 X 8 dish.

#### Ingredients

Casserole Ministry

- 2 teaspoons olive oil
- 2 medium onions small diced, about 3 cups
  - 2 jalapenos, stemmed and minced optional Note: You might put these in at home
    - but I would leave out for the casserole mission.
- 1 tablespoon salt, plus more for pasta cooking water
- 2 pounds extra lean ground beef Note: You may use ground turkey or ½ turkey and ½ beef.
- 5 tablespoons Mexican chili powder Note: You may use regular chili powder.
- 1 tablespoon oregano
- 2 tablespoons minced garlic
- 1 (28 ounce) can whole plum tomatoes, broken with your hands, with juices
- 2 cans kidney beans, drained
- 1 pound elbow macaroni
- 1 pound medium cheddar cheese

#### **Directions**

- Heat olive oil over medium-high heat in a 6-quart soup pot. Add onions, jalapenos (if desired), and 2 teaspoons of the salt and cook until soft, 2 minutes. Add ground beef, chili powder, oregano, and garlic and cook, breaking up any clumps of meat with a spoon, for 5 minutes. Add tomatoes, beans, and 1/2 cup of water, stir, and bring chili to a boil. Reduce heat to a simmer and cook until thickened to chili consistency, about 20 minutes. Taste and add 1 more teaspoon salt, if needed.
- While the chili is simmering, cook macaroni according to package directions in boiling salted water, drain in a colander, rinse under cool running water and set aside.
- Grate cheddar cheese and set aside.
- Spray a 9 x 13.5-inch or other 3-quart casserole dish.
- Once chili has finished cooking, fold in the cooked macaroni and 1/3 of the cheddar cheese. Transfer chili-mac to the baking dish and top with remaining cheese.
- Wrap and freeze.
- To bake: Defrost in refrigerator overnight. Bake in a preheated 400° oven until heated through and cheese is melted, 10 ó 20 minutes. Remove from oven and let cool 5 minutes before serving.







#### Trustees

As Trustees, our primary responsibility is the longevity of the property. We are trusted and tasked with insuring the property is fit for church use today as well as tomorrow. Before resuming our meeting schedule in September, the Trustees spent a couple of hours walking through the church building and Agape House to compile a list of tasks and projects. That list contains 56 items, and we didn't visit the Hunt cemetery or completely go through either building. Some of the tasks were brought to our attention by you and others we saw ourselves. The tasks range in size and cost from adjusting weather stripping to bell tower repairs and roof replacement. When we can, we do the work ourselves or recruit congregation members to assist on work days. When we can't, we solicit proposals and strive to contract the best value possible.

For our part, we have scheduled 3 workdays this Fall: Sep 27, Oct 25, and Nov 15. Our focus at the September workday will be long-term grounds appearance. We need to finish the grading around Agape and the Scout Shack and plant grass seed over the fresh top soil and hope to remove the dogwood trees in front of the church in preparation for replacements. The October workday (rain date is Nov 1) is the traditional Fall cleanup of leaves, sticks, and other debris before the Turkey Dinner. The November workday will target some of the other tasks on our list. One task of interest is stripping and caulking the church windows along Joppa Road, but that may change due to weather or other priorities. Please come and join us on any of these workdays. We try very hard to keep the time commitment to just 9:00am to noon and understand you may only be available part of that time. If you can't make the work days and would like to help on your own schedule, we can accommodate that, too. We are in this together, so every little bit shared makes us all look better. --- Ken Parnish ---


