



Dear Friends.



When morning eventually came, I rushed downstairs and quickly opened the box under the tree with my name on it and there it was — my new Decca guitar. Years later I would learn that the Decca guitar was not the most expensive guitar. But on that particular morning it was my guitar.

As a beginner guitar, the strings were set high off the frets. That meant that I had to press harder with the tips of my fingers in order to get the proper chord sounds. Since my father played guitar, he began teaching me various chords by showing me the proper placement of my fingers on the frets. With his guidance, I practiced and practiced and practiced. Soon the ends of my fingertips began burning and then numerous blisters started to appear. But I kept practicing and practicing until the burning and blisters went away and hard calluses started to form; which in turn made playing the chords a lot easier. In time, I would love learning new songs and new chords.

Over the years, I have learned two important principles about learning to play a musical instrument. First, in order for one to play better one needs to practice. There is no substitute for practice. Secondly, a guitar, like any instrument, needs to be properly tuned. Keeping an instrument in tune is vitally important to the overall quality of the music.

These two things are applicable to our own spiritual journey. Let's take the importance of practice. The practice of spiritual disciplines is essential to greater growth and maturity in one's faith. The classic spiritual disciplines are as follows: study, prayer, worship, service, fasting, solitude, meditation, confession, simplicity, and celebration. The daily practice of these disciplines is not about achieving something per say; like trying to get God's attention. The daily practice of such disciplines is about opening a door for God to get our attention.

The second principle is about staying in tune. And this principle really is derived from practicing the first. Opening the door to God's grace enables us to tune in to what God would have us be and do. A musical instrument can not play itself; the splendor of its music is released through the heart and skills of the artisan who holds it in his or her hand.

September reminds us that summer is drawing to a close and that soon our busy fall schedules will be upon us. And the question for us is this — how do we keep a proper balance in life without allowing the busyness of the world to rob us of our humanity and our connection to each other? Moreover, for we who claim a belief in God, how do we stay connected to God's claim on us? The answer to those questions may be as simple as learning to play an instrument- practice, practice, practice and opening the door of one's heart for a tune-up.


# **Ready for Rally Day!**

# JOURNEY THROUGH THE BIBLE



Journey Through the Bible is a long term approach to studying the Bible and highlights pivotal points in the Scripture, lifting up the Bible's most significant stories, themes, events, and people. During each session we will cover four dimensions.

- **Dimension 1** helps us get into the main text.
- **Dimension 2** provides historical information and helps us glean insights in what the passage meant for its first readers.
- **Dimension 3** gives us insight into how to apply insights from scripture to life situations.
- **Dimension 4** offers each person a daily personal Journey Plan for those interested in reading the whole Bible verse by verse.

In September 2014, we will begin **Volume 10** – **Mark.** Bible Study will begin on Monday, September 15, 2014; meeting at 10:45 a.m. and at 7:00 p.m. in the Adult Education

# Chicken & Stuffing Casserole

(8" x 8" pan)

#### Ingredients:

- 1 box Stove Top Stuffing (Chicken Flavor)
- 2 boneless Chicken Breasts

Participation and support by Hunt's members probably were at all time highs for the 2014 BCCW, as BCCW has become a truly church-wide mission project. (Personally, I am very appreciative and grateful for all of the support.)

There are many thanks due, including, but not necessarily limited, to the following:



- Hunt's for allowing the church to be the base/host site for the BCCW, including for its planning meetings over the year, as well as storage of supplies on the right side (as looking in from Old Court Road) of the garage.
- Those who donated to the special 2013 Advent and 2014 Lenten offerings, half of which was given to BCCW.
- Those who donated thirteen gift cards to be auctioned at the silent auction (and to Beth Woody for suggesting the idea).
- Those who donated additional monies to BCCW.

- Those who participated in the silent auction and bought items at the flea market and book sale.

• Howard Lin was not only Hunt's "official" photographer during each day, but also went to many of the other BCCW sites too, including the Sunday and Friday dinners and the breakfasts.

Weather-wise, the July 21-25 week was not the best we ever had, but it certainly, was not as hot and humid as most of the other BCCW weeks. No rain!

There were no reported significant injuries at any of the sites.

# LOUING CONTROL OF LOUIS COME AND CONTROL OF LOUIS CONTROL

A succinct summary of the BCCW work is as follows:

- Of the 47 sites needing work, a total of 31 sites were worked on during the week.
  - 28 were completed.
  - 3 sites had some work done.
  - 9 sites had no work done for various reasons.
  - No one went to 7 of the potential sites.
- Of the 16 ramps needed, 12 were completed.
- Of the 80 potential work sites in the year since the 2013 BCCW, 60 were completed. (A small group visits sites during the year to do emergency or smaller priority projects.)

At the Friday night closing program, Hunt's shared the BCCW Ramp Award with three other teams; our designation was for the "largest number of workers per foot of ramp."



The Hunt's team's first ramp took three days at a house whose address is actually on Pulaski Highway in Rosedale. Both the elderly husband and wife have severe mobility issues and would typically just leave the house via paramedics or the wife with great assistance by her daughter. The husband had been housebound for eight years in a wheelchair. We actually built two ramps, for a total of 75 feet (one was a 14' ramp to get from their backyard to their garage). When I first visited them, I made it clear that they needed to provide clear access to the front door as the ramp

would be built to that door as it was wider than the back door. They literally had not seen their front door for years. After we built the ramp, the husband said how he would use the ramp to get the paper, take out the trash, and get the mail. I cautioned him about not going out by himself as he might not be able to get himself back up the ramp. However, when I went back that Thursday, I was with him and he did it both ways himself. He also said how he just liked opening the front door and listening to the Route 40 traffic. Several weeks later Glenn and Linda installed a rear entry mailbox to enable him to get the mail. He apologized to them for marking up the ramp with his wheelchair as he had been using it so much! Supposedly, he even went on a ride with his daughter too.



Our second ramp was in Eastpoint and was 27' long and took  $1\frac{1}{2}$  days. Afterwards, on Friday afternoon, some of us went to another site which was being cleaned up and then to another church's site whose ramp in Middle River was taking longer than anticipated.

During BCCW, we often do projects which make life easier for people; we often give them opportunity; we often give them hope; we may give them more freedom. Notwithstanding, sometimes the residents do not appear to be that appreciative. However, the site in Rosedale, based on my 30 years of doing BCCW, has to rank as one of the best feel good experiences of any site. The residents changed their life style enough to allow us to build a ramp from the



front door; the husband was given hope to be able to get out of the house on his own and was anxious to use the ramp by himself; they both expressed appreciation; he is using the ramp on a regular basis; he expressed his desire to be more self-reliant and do some of the items which one of his daughters would have to drive to their house to do every day! It seems that we really did make a significant life-changing difference in the lives of the two residents, and possibly their daughters too. This site is what makes participating in BCCW worthwhile; it helps to wipe out those memories of those sites which were "horrible" or when the weather was excruciatingly hot and humid! The following are reflections from Glenn, based on his 2014 experience: "I thoroughly enjoyed my week with the Hunt's team. It's a great feeling to show up at a site where there is little or no access for a wheelchair/walker bound person, and after we finish there is a ramp that provides much easier access. It's also enjoyable working with folks that may have little or no experience in construction, but give it their all. At the end of

each day, I know I was tired. But I felt good because I knew we were making a positive difference for someone. Everyone on the Hunt's team made a significant contribution to what we were able to accomplish. Thanks to everyone!"

Also, Melissa said, "Building a ramp with a team is a lot of fun and even more satisfying when you see the client use it at the end. We had some high school kids from the Board of Child Care come to help at the site where I worked which was meaningful as well. Since there were occasionally extra hands available, I had a chance to weed the client's garden. I hope that even more Hunt's members can work for a day or two next year!"

THANKS AGAIN TO ALL for whatever type of support which you may have given to BCCW over the year! Hopefully, our 2014 success and high participation will carry over to our 32<sup>nd</sup> annual BCCW to be held in 2015!



## **SHEPHERD PROGRAM**

A number of years ago, Carol Highfield and I started a "Shepherd" program at Hunt's. We felt there was a need to maintain connections within the membership, to prevent people from simply

"disappearing", or feeling slighted. We were blessed to have about 30 members step forward and volunteer to be shepherds. Their role was to touch base with their "flock", and sort of serve as a liaison with the minister. Depending on outside commitments and time availability, the flock of a shepherd varied between 2 and 12. We had two meetings per year, mostly to readjust the flocks and shepherds due to membership changes. Involvement with the flock for most shepherds consisted of sending birthday cards (and perhaps anniversary or holiday cards), and chatting a bit now and then. 


#### Additional information about the Organist and Organ Builder, Timothy Edward Smith:

Timothy Edward Smith, organist and organ builder, earned degrees in organ performance from Wheaton College, Northwestern University and The Boston Conservatory. His concert career has included a dozen appearances at annual conventions of the Organ Historical Society, several of which have been rebroadcast nationally on *Pipedreams*, and two appearances with The Boston Symphony Orchestra under Director Seiji Ozawa. He released three compact discs last year on the Raven label, including a program of French music entitled *Pipes and Angels*, recorded in New Bedford, Massachusetts. As a church musician, Mr. Smith has led both volunteer and professional choirs and has conducted numerous works for chorus and orchestra. Currently, he is Organist and Choirmaster at Trinity Church in York, Pennsylvania.

Mr. Smith is the Executive Director of the Portageville Chapel Board. The Portageville Chapel, located in upstate New York, provides a place where organists can retreat for a week of uninterrupted practice in a private rehearsal facility to restore their artistry and explore the splendor of the Genesee Valley. He is also the owner of Chesapeake Organ Service, home ported in Red Lion, Pennsylvania and serving the Mid-Atlantic region, New York, and New England.
