Friends:

On a Saturday night, Laurie and I went to TGIF's (Thank God It's Friday) for dinner. Since we had a 15 minute wait for an available table, we had a chance to people watch. The place was packed. I saw small tables where couples sat facing one another. Scattered about were larger tables filled with several families probably celebrating a birthday or coming home from the children's sporting events. I saw one part of the staff busing the tables and clearing them for the next group of people. The waiters and waitresses were busy taking orders and bringing orders of food to the tables that were assigned to them. You could hear the hum of people talking, laughing, and the sound of music playing over the speakers. Indeed, the place was alive and jumping.

Finally, the hand-held buzzer that was given to us when we first arrived buzzed signaling that we were next to be seated. The waitress walked us to our table and gave us two menus. Inside the menu I read these words, *"In here it's always Friday."* In other words, when you come to this place of business it is a time to celebrate.

As I think about this experience, I wonder if the reason the modern church today is shrinking in numbers is because we have lost our reason to celebrate. When people arrive at our doors, what might that experience be like if there is someone there to greet us and escort us to a place to sit and later on be included in the open invitation to sit at the table of God's acceptance? Is the church alive and dancing in God's Spirit?

On that first Easter morning, the women went to the tomb thinking that their hopes and dreams had ended on that awful Friday when Jesus died on the cross. They brought with them burial spices because only death occupied their thoughts now. The only thing left for them to do was to at least give the body of Jesus a proper burial.

Suddenly, an angel greeted them, saying, *"You are looking for Jesus of Nazareth. He is not here. He is risen!"*

That is the Easter message: God raises Jesus to new life! The power of the resurrection forms and shapes a new community; a community that can say with bold assurance, *"In here it's always Sunday"*, each day is a new day to begin again. That's hope for us not only in terms of eternity but for us right now. In the Risen Christ, we get a clear glimpse of God's kingdom coming alive on earth as it is in heaven.

New Testament scholar and author, N.T. Wright wrote: "Jesus' resurrection is the beginning of God's new project not to snatch people away from earth to heaven but to colonize earth with the life of heaven. That, after all, is what the Lord's Prayer is about."

May each one of you have a blessed Easter!

FOR ALL WHO ATTEND HUNT'S SERVICES AND ACTIVITIES

As you are aware, this winter, adverse weather played havoc with many area events and activities, including Hunt's services and activities. Our existing adverse weather closing notification procedure was not adequate. Consequently, at the March Church Council meeting, it was approved to begin a robo-calling and texting notification system, which we believe will enable cancellations to be communicated in a more timely and user-friendly method. Many with school age children may already be part of such a system; many other churches have implemented such a system, and it seems to be appreciated by those who receive the notification.



In addition to closings due to adverse weather, this system can be used for other causes, such as no heat, no electricity, no water, etc., which may occur anytime throughout the year, which is why we are beginning to implement it now, rather than wait until next winter.

We anticipate using a service to actually do the robo-calling or texting at the request of an authorized person from Hunt's. If the line is busy, robo-calling will try several more times; it will also leave a message on an answering machine after the message.

Since there will be a cost per call or text, we are requesting that only <u>one</u> member per household be placed on the list to be notified and preferably by only <u>one</u> method—either a call or a text. (Note—A text will cost half as much as a call.) Notwithstanding, due to your household "dynamics," if more than one individual needs to be contacted or the designated contact person needs to be notified by both methods, that can be done. Some of the details of the new system still need to be determined (e.g., what time to do the notification by, who are the authorized Hunt's individuals); however, we need to begin to develop and compile the notification data base now.

- 1. If the Hunt's office already has your telephone number, we will **assume** that it can be used for robo calling **and** for your entire family unit. If there are two numbers, the home number will be used. If you are not sure what telephone number(s) Hunt's has, contact Beth Woody in the Church office (410-339-7770 or beth@huntsumc.org).
- 2. However, if you want to opt-out and you do not want to potentially get a robo call from Hunt's, then let Beth Woody know.
- 3. Or, if you want another telephone number to be used (such as a cell phone) for the robo call, then, likewise, notify Beth, along with the name(s) that the notification will serve.
- 4. Or, if you would rather receive a text, then notify Beth with the necessary number, along with name(s) that the notification will serve.
- 5. And, for any of you for whom Hunt's does not have a telephone number, if you would like to be on Hunt's notification list, then contact Beth with your telephone number and whether you would like a robo call or a text, along with the names that the notification will serve.

Utilizing such a service has the potential to inform most, if not all, people for whom we have contact information, that there is a change in scheduling for whatever the reason. Presently, it is anticipated to use this service sparingly for the cancellation of church-wide events; hopefully, it would never have to be used.

2) Casseroles need to be in the Hunt's freezer by 10 a.m. on Wednesday, April 1.

3) We have the opportunity to serve a meal to the homeless at <u>Manna House on Saturday morning</u>, <u>April 11</u>. Five people are needed. The group will meet in the church parking lot and leave by 7:25 a.m. and would be back at the church by 10:45 a.m. Please let Melissa Regan know if you are interested.

4) We are collecting new and used <u>athletic shoes</u> of any size (but no cleats) for a group of kids and young adults in South Africa. There is a labeled bin in the coat room. Barb Cox will be going with her adult sons and a small group of volunteers on their annual mission next summer to teach lacrosse and deliver school supplies and shoes to children there through a program called The South African Lacrosse Project (see <u>http://www.southafricanlacrosse.org/</u>).

5) The <u>Lent special offering</u> goes to support the Baltimore County Christian Workcamp and Camp Hope, both important hands-on missions that Hunt's members participate in to repair homes of people who can't manage it on their own.

So how did we do?

Despite Church services being cancelled (due to bad weather) on February 22 – and encountering snow/sleet/freezing rain/ice on March 1st – we still managed to collect <u>101.5 dozen cookies</u>! (That's 1,218 cookies!) -- Not bad!

A staff member welcomed us, had us place the cookies in the pantry area (next to the kitchen), and <u>immediately</u> began placing bags of our cookies in the boxes which were going to be distributed to the cottages (where the boys and girls live) on Tuesday morning. Ham and Potatoes

Ingredients:


1 tsp. salt

"Casserole Ministry"


3 cups water
3 cups potatoes, cubed
¹/₂ cup milk
¹/₂ cup butter
¹/₂ cup flour
2 cups ham, cooked, cut into small pieces
3 tbsp. chopped parsley
2 cups canned peas, drained (or 2 cups frozen peas)
1 cup grated cheddar cheese
(Optional: about 1 teaspoon of fresh black pepper)

- 1. Add salt to water and boil.
- 2. Add potatoes and cook for 15 minutes. Drain and reserve liquid.
- 3. Add milk to liquid. Set aside.
- 4. Melt butter in saucepan, add onions, and cook until soft.
- 5. Blend flour (whisk) into milk mixture and cook on low heat until thickened.
- 6. Add ham, parsley, peas, onions, and potatoes to milk mixture and pour into casserole pan. *This recipe makes a generous 8" x 8" x 3" casserole. If doubled, it will make three 8" x 8" x 2" (cake pan) casseroles*
- 7. Top with grated cheese.
- 8. Cover with aluminum foil.
- 9. Freeze and place directions on top.
