LUKE 18:9-14

9 He also told this parable to some who trusted in themselves that they were righteous and regarded others with contempt: 10 "Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. 11 The Pharisee, standing by himself, was praying thus, 'God, I thank you that I am not like other people: thieves, rogues, adulterers, or even like this tax collector. 12 I fast twice a week; I give a tenth of all my income.' 13 But the tax collector, standing far off, would not even look up to heaven, but was beating his breast and saying, 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner!' 14 I tell you, this man went down to his home justified rather than the other; for all who exalt themselves will be humbled, but all who humble themselves will be exalted."

Devotional

It's hard to read anything in Luke's account of the Good News without risking a sense of social vertigo; the accepted order of things has been flipped upside down. Business as usual has been suspended in favor of a glimpse of God's reign. Animals bear witness first to the incarnation. Samaritans become social workers. And... a tax collector surpasses a Pharisee on the holy-meter? How utterly shocking and scandalous!

The repentant pause we are called to during this purple season is more than just an internal audit of personal responsibility. Rather, Lent underscores what Luke's gospel challenges us to do in what the tax collector practices in particular. He repents. It is not just for personal behavior, but for participation in a way of life organized around taking advantage of people. Not just him but the system, too. Now, I'm sure he had a family to feed, kids who needed to go to college, maybe payments to make on the family donkey. Don't we all? And it's not like he *created* the system or even *wanted* to take advantage of people day in, day out. After all, we all have to make a living, don't we?

Don't we?

There's the rub. We are called to repent even if we just participate in (and benefit from) unjust systems that we did not create. We aren't let off the hook. Echoing the prophets who came before him, Jesus reminds us again of our call to act kindly, love justice, and walk humbly with God. Friends, we've got a long road ahead of us.

Prayer

God, help us remember. Help us remember the dangers of self-righteousness, the myth of privilege earned, the brokenness of a world in which people are still oppressed. And help us remember your call to act kindly, live justly, and walk humbly with you. Without any of this, our worship is hollow and our lives meaningless. We ask this in the name of your crucified Son. Amen.

"Casserole Ministry" – Due Date: March 4 Thirty-Minute Shepherd's Pie – adapted from Rachel Ray Yields 1 (8" × 8" casserole)

- 1 pound potatoes, such as russet, peeled and cubed
- 1 tablespoons sour cream or softened <u>cream cheese</u>
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup cream, for a lighter version substitute vegetable or chicken broth
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 1 tablespoon <u>extra-virgin olive oil</u>, 1 turn of the pan
- 1 pound ground beef or ground lamb or ground turkey
- 1/2 16 oz. package of frozen peas and carrots
- 1/2 onion, chopped
- 1 tablespoons butter
- 1 tablespoons <u>all-purpose flour</u>
- 1/2 cup beef stock or broth
- 1 teaspoons Worcestershire
- 1/2 teaspoon sweet paprika (optional)

Directions

Boil potatoes in salted water until tender, about 12 minutes. Drain potatoes and pour them into a bowl. Combine sour cream, egg yolk and cream. Add the cream mixture into potatoes and mash until potatoes are almost smooth.

Alternative...use instant mashed potatoes or readymade potatoes.

Preheat a large skillet over medium high heat. Add oil to hot pan with beef or lamb. Season meat with salt and pepper. Brown and crumble meat for 3 or 4 minutes. If you are using lamb and the pan is fatty, spoon away some of the drippings.

Add chopped onion and frozen peas and carrots. Cook veggies with meat 5 minutes, stirring frequently.

In a second small skillet over medium heat cook butter and flour together 2 minutes. Whisk in broth and Worcestershire sauce. Thicken gravy 1 minute. Add gravy to meat and vegetables. ---- Fill a small rectangular casserole 8×8 with meat and vegetable mixture. Spoon potatoes over meat evenly. Wrap and freeze.

<u>LABEL</u>: Thaw in refrigerator overnight. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. When thawed, cook in oven for 20 minutes. After 20 minutes, broil for 4 minutes 6 to 8 inches from the heat until potatoes are evenly browned. Enjoy!

Better Than Mama's Chili Mac



- Yield: 6 to 8 servings
- Use 1 9 X 13 casserole or cut recipe in half to use an 8 X 8 dish.

Ingredients

- 2 teaspoons olive oil
- 2 medium onions small diced, about 3 cups
- 2 jalapenos, stemmed and minced, Optional Note: You might put these in at home...but I would leave out for the casserole mission.
- 1 tablespoon salt, plus more for pasta cooking water
- 2 pounds extra lean ground beef *Note: You may use ground turkey or ½ turkey and ½ beef.*
 - 5 tablespoons Mexican chili powder
- 1 tablespoon oregano
- 2 tablespoons minced garlic
 - 1 (28 ounce) can whole plum tomatoes, broken with your hands, with juices
- 2 cans kidney beans, drained
- 1 pound elbow macaroni
- 1 pound medium cheddar cheese

Directions

- Heat olive oil over medium-high heat in a 6-quart soup pot. Add onions, jalapenos (if desired), and 2 teaspoons of the salt and cook until soft, 2 minutes. Add ground beef, chili powder, oregano, and garlic and cook, breaking up any clumps of meat with a spoon, for 5 minutes. Add tomatoes, beans, and 1/2 cup of water, stir, and bring chili to a boil. Reduce heat to a simmer and cook until thickened to chili consistency, about 20 minutes. Taste and add 1 more teaspoon salt, if needed.
- While the chili is simmering, cook macaroni according to package directions in boiling salted water, drain in a colander, rinse under cool running water and set aside.
- Grate cheddar cheese and set aside.
- Spray a 9 x 13.5-inch or other 3-quart casserole dish.
- Once chili has finished cooking, fold in the cooked macaroni and 1/3 of the cheddar cheese. Transfer chili-mac to the baking dish and top with remaining cheese.
- Wrap and freeze.
- To bake: Defrost in refrigerator overnight. Bake in a preheated 400° oven until heated through and cheese is melted, 10 20 minutes. Remove from oven and let cool 5 minutes before serving.
