HUNT'S 1ST QUARTER 2016 FINANCIAL SUMMARY

Board of Child Care (BCC)



This is one of the mission projects which Hunt's has supported for many years, albeit presently to a somewhat limited extent, e.g., a special offering once per year, cookie drive in February, and the collection of Box Tops and Labels for Education (the latter are pooled together to redeem for items for BCC or the children).

BCC's principal mission is to serve disadvantaged children from difficult family lives; this is done through a variety of services, such as residential services, group homes, the Strawbridge School, treatment foster care homes, a mental health clinic, an early learning program, and adoptive services. See the Missions bulletin board above the water fountains on the first floor for more information or go to www.boardofchildcare.org. You can also sign up for their electronic newsletter.

BCC is assisted in its mission by the BCC Auxiliary, which is a volunteer-run organization composed of individuals from UM churches who share the love of Christ with the children and families served by BCC, by providing that little something extra to enrich their lives. Some of the Auxiliary activities include giving handmade afghans/quilts (70"x35") to BCC high school graduates, assembling and distributing Thanksgiving baskets (each region is assigned specific food items), seeking donations and conducting a Christmas store for the children and their families; distributing Welcome Bags, Valentine treats and Easter baskets; providing trips to ball games, skating, etc.

The Auxiliary meets twice a year by region and once per year as a conference (i.e., all of the regions). Mary Ellen and I represented Hunt's at the recent Spring Baltimore Region meeting at Fork UMC; the Annual Meeting will be Thursday May 12 at the BCC Randallstown campus and the Fall region meeting, October 1 at Havre de Grace UMC.


IN GENERAL, THE PICTORIAL DIRECTORY COMPANY OFFERS:

A professional photograph, 8x10 inches, of each family or single person posing for a portrait FREE with an option to select other poses and sizes for cash.

Publication of a new directory, designed by us and using our church activity pictures; and a church roster – GET THIS – which can include 2 phone numbers and 2 email addresses in addition to the usual names, address, and phone. All participants will receive a free Directory.

The church's responsibilities are: First to form a volunteer committee to plan and assemble the Directory and Second to engage EACH of you, later, to schedule an appointment (can be done electronically) and sit for a portrait. Our target is 139 portraits. Hunt's Church Preschool's staff & families, friends, neighbors,

coworkers, etc. can also participate, but their portraits will not be in the Directory.





The Kidder-Thomas Scholarship Fund resulted from generous bequests under the wills of Sam Kidder and Jean Thomas. The sum has been invested along with subsequent donations, and the income earned from this investment is for scholarships for "worthy students who are members of Hunt's Church."

Trustees of the Fund will consider applications for scholarship aid each year. There are three trustees that oversee the fund: Chair of the Church Council (Robert Sparks), Chair of the Finance Committee (Bruce Douglas), and Co-Chairs of the Board of Trustees (Linda Flavin, Rusty Erdman).

Applications must be received by June 10, 2016.

(An application is included in this newsletter.) Additional applications are available at the Church Office. The completed application should be submitted along with an official transcript of high school or college grades, preferably through the spring of the current year.

Scholarships are for undergraduate students enrolled full time (12 credits or more per semester), and graduate students enrolled part time or full time (6 credits or more per semester), in an accredited college or university in the United States.

In awarding scholarships, the Trustees will primarily consider the applicants':

- Academic merit
- Financial need
- Church involvement and activities
- Community involvement and leadership







Scholarship amounts will vary depending on the number of scholarships awarded each fall and the income earned from the investment principal. Generally, the awards will be in the range of \$500 to \$1,500.

Applicants must make an annual application for each year of full time undergraduate or part or full time graduate status.

Baked Pasta with Italian Sausage

Due Date: Monday, May 2

Makes one 1 casserole (9 x 13) or two medium (8 x 8)

Large casserole serves 4 - 6.

Ingredients:

1 pound penne pasta or fusilli

2 teaspoons olive oil

4 cloves chopped garlic

1-pound mild/sweet Italian sausage, chopped or torn into bite-sized pieces.

1 cup chopped onion

1 can 14.5 ounce can tomato sauce or pasta sauce

1 can diced tomatoes

2 cups shredded mozzarella or mixed Italian cheeses

Options to add for more flavor: ½ teaspoon red pepper flakes, 2 Tablespoons capers, ½ cup chopped kalamata olives, 2 anchovy filets – drained and chopped. All are optional...just indicate which you may have added on the label.

- 1. Cook pasta according to package directions for 8 10 minutes. Drain and dress lightly with olive oil. Reserve ½ cup of pasta water to add to tomato sauce.
- 2. Heat oil in a skillet. Brown chopped sausage in skillet. Drain excess oil, remove meat from skillet and set aside.
- 3. Heat additional oil if needed. Brown onion and garlic. When browned, you may add optional other ingredients red pepper flakes, capers, anchovies.
- 4. Add tomato sauce and diced tomatoes. Simmer for 10 minutes, stirring occasionally.
- 5. Add sausage and ½ cup pasta water. Add chopped Kalamata olives if desired.
- 6. Toss sauce with pasta and place in baking dish. Top with Mozzarella or other cheese.
- 7. Wrap well with foil sprayed with cooking spray and freeze.

Baked Pasta with Italian Sausage

Ingredients: pasta, Italian sausage, olive oil, tomato sauce, diced tomatoes, garlic, onion, mozzarella or other Italian cheese.

May also include: red pepper flakes, capers, anchovies, black olives.

Instructions:

- 1. Defrost in refrigerator overnight.
- 2. Bake in an oven pre-heated to 350 degrees for 20 30 minutes until bubbly and until the cheese has melted.



Cinco de Mayo Taco Casserole

Ingredients:

1 lb. lean ground beef

1 15ounce can spicy chili beans or black beans

1 cup mild Thick and Chunky Salsa

2 cups broken tortilla chips

3/4 cup sour cream

4 green onions, sliced

1 medium tomato, chopped

1 cup shredded Cheddar or Monterey Jack Cheese

Directions:

- 1. Brown the beef over medium heat in a skillet until cooked thoroughly. Drain excess fat.
- 2. Stir in beans and salsa. Heat until just simmering.
- 3. Spread broken tortilla chips on the bottom of an ungreased casserole. Top with beef mixture. Spread sour cream on top. Sprinkle with onions, tomato and cheese.
- 4. Wrap with foil sprayed with cooking spray and freeze. Or if ready to cook right away, bake uncovered for 20 30 minutes in a 350-degree oven until hot and bubbly.


