Friends,

A few weeks ago, many of our children finished their school year. When my daughter, Samantha, was six-years-old, I asked her one day in late spring about when her last day of class would be at her school. She looked at me and reflected on my question. She asked, "Dad, when is the last day of church?" Leave it to a PK (preacher's kid) to ask this question.

I think I understand why she asked that question. If school has a last day, then why doesn't church have a last day?

The church, however, is called to be faithful in season and out of season. While we may take vacations, the church cannot vacate its responsibilities to each other and to the community. But that's true with education, too. Just because the school term ends, the task and joy of learning new things still goes on for a lifetime.

The writer of Hebrews was addressing this very concern. Some people were neglecting to meet together. No one knows exactly why they were doing this. But whatever the reason, the writer of the passage admonished them to return.

Why meet together? The writer is clear about this: to stir up good works and encourage each other. Growth doesn't happen in isolation. We grow in our relationships with one another. That's what it means to be the church. D. L. Moody once called on a leading citizen in Chicago to ask him to return to

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church and to the fellowship of other believers. They were seated in the man's parlor. It was winter and coal was burning in the fireplace. The man objected, saying that he could be just as good a Christian outside the church as in it. Moody said nothing, but stepped to the fireplace, took the tongs, picked a blazing coal from the fire and set if off by itself. In silence, the two watched it smolder and go out. "I see," said the man.

There is no such thing as a lone ranger in the faith. We need each other. And so I invite you to remember the church. I hope you get a break and enjoy some time with family and friends. But don't neglect worship. If you are away, visit other churches. (By the way, pick up a bulletin and give it to me. I like to know what other churches are doing.)

During the months of July and August, the Worship Committee and I have designed nine worship Sundays on Galatians 5:22-23 and "The Fruits of Spirit" (Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness, and Self-control). It so happens that on the altar at Hunt's we have nine kneelers and one gate kneeler. All of them have been handmade by certain women of the church thirty years ago. Embroidered on each kneeler is the name of a particular "Fruit" that God's Spirit offers to us.

Therefore, I invite you to attend this Summer Sermon Series. On one Sunday, July 24, the Rev. Kathy Barna will be preaching on the fruit of "Patience." Kathy is the daughter of the late Phil and Joan Eichelberger. On our final Sunday of the series, August 28th, we will rededicate the altar kneelers and celebrate Holy Communion by kneeling at the altar. After the service, we will then meet in VanMetre Hall for refreshments and fellowship.

Have a great summer and I hope to see you at church.

I am sharing the stories I told at her memorial service; they seemed to have touched many people's hearts.

July 9, 2015:

Good morning. My name is, Linda Flavin.

Mara and I have been friends for over 25 years and I want to share a few stories about her. Even though we came from very different backgrounds — I was born in upstate NY, while she was born in Latvia — our friendship was forged on four common loves.....our faith, music, travel and animals (mostly cats) and a few things we hated: diet, exercise and hot weather. She would have hated today!!!

I met Mara when we took a long term Bible study many years ago and became friends. We took almost yearly Bible studies after that and strengthened and talked about our faith and how it impacted our lives. Mara always had an interesting point to make.

It was in that study, that we also met a woman named Jean Lippy and she started to organize a weekly after church lunch. It became "The Lunch Bunch". Over the years, the group size ebbed and flowed, Mara and I were the last core members that still went on a weekly basis.

During many of those lunches, we would discuss our week. -- I was an Animal Control Officer, so she would always ask me, what interesting thing happened this week.

One of her favorite stories was a cruelty investigation I did for a little black poodle, out for several days in the same spot with no shelter. The house was on a heavily traveled main street. I went out and couldn't find any dog. Finally I found a statue in the yard and told her I guess that's what they saw every day driving by and why he never moved. She just thought that was hysterical and always had me tell the story when someone new came to our group.

Inevitably, our conversation would turn to our cats. Showing pictures and talking about what funny goofy things they had done, much to the chagrin of some of our fellow diners, "Oh no, not another cat story was often heard!!" We were definitely considered the crazy cat ladies!! One of Mara's favorite sayings was: "You know, no outfit is complete unless it has some cat hair on it."

We would talk about our families and she would always talk about her children, Margo and Davey. She would tell us of all your accomplishments. She was so proud of both of you. And that is when we heard her excitement about becoming a grandmother. My goodness, Mara just adored her Sully and Addy, She beamed when she spoke of them and showed us pictures.

But you can only get to know so much about a person over lunch. It was travel that really forged our friendship. We have taken numerous trips together, many of them as roommates. We traveled to China, Scandinavia, all over Europe, Israel, Russia, New Zealand and Australia. The Australian trip was planned so we could visit Margo and Davis while they were in Medical School, although it morphed into a much larger trip. Not only did we see the world together and share many new experiences, we shared our lives.

Mara spoke several languages and on every cruise she would hope to meet someone from Latvia, so she could speak in her native language. We would always check the name tags for the country the staff were from, hoping to find one. While on one of our cruises she finally met a young woman from Latvia. When she told her, her name, she said "Oh Maaahhhrrrraaaa!" Apparently it's a very common name at home. For the rest of the trip and even when we were home, instead of "Mara" (which I often mispronounced) and she gave up on me, I would call her "Maaahhhhrrrraaa" which would make her laugh, as she rolled her eyes because I got it right!!

Another area of common interest was music, we sang together in the choir for many years. I love music, love to listen to it, love singing it. Mara was a highly accomplished musician, whereas, I was not and this occasionally led to situations when attending a music event of some type together. One of those was on one of our many cruises together. Often times, the evening cruise entertainment was a pianist and, whereas I would enjoy listening to the performance, I soon realized Mara was having a completely different experience. She would make comments about the mistakes they were making during the performance that she felt weren't quite up to snuff. One time, when I was really enjoying a piece, she leaned over and said "Hummph. I played that piece better when I was 8 years old", ahh, such is life with a real musician.

Mara had this talent because her mom always made sure, as a little girl, that she had piano lessons, even though they didn't have a lot of money. — This musical talent also showed up at the church during a choir practice some years ago when, the pianist was absent. The choir director, Dick Blanchard, was trying to teach a piece of music to us while also plunking out the tune. Apparently, this must have been like fingers on a chalkboard to Mara. She walked up and said, "Maybe I can help;" then proceeded to sit on the piano bench and play beautifully even though she'd never played the piece before. We were shocked. "Where have you been hiding all this talent?," we asked. She waved us away as if it was nothing big, but we had discovered another of her talents and loves.

When we had trouble replacing the organist in our church, she decided to take lessons. Most people would not take on a challenge like that, but she was undaunted. She practiced at night, on her way home from work, at Towson University and eventually shared her new love during Sunday services. Her car was always in the parking lot and you knew she was practicing. She was quite good, although she never wanted us to say that. She just wanted to be even better, so she continued to take lessons.

Mara, my friend, I will forever treasure our times together. And just like cat hair on a favorite outfit, you will always be a part of me. I love you and will miss you.

The lady told the salesman she was going to get a plate and fork because their power went out an hour ago!

What are the benefits to the resident receiving the help?

It is hard to say . . . as it does vary. In the past, some did not have running water, some could not leave their houses except via a stretcher by paramedics; one person was able to come home from a nursing home where his life was dismal and has made remarkable progress in his home; others may not be as dramatic, but, hopefully, our assistance brings some sunshine into their lives and makes their lives better.

What are the benefits to those who volunteer?

These may include earning school community service hours, making new friends, having a workcamp experience in your own "backyard" and sleeping in your own bed at night, experiencing Christian fellowship and personal satisfaction; as well as aspiring and striving to comply with one of Jesus' teachings/parables as found in Matthew 25:40 (CEV)(The Final Judgment)—The king will answer, "Whenever you did it for any of my people, no matter how unimportant they seemed, you did it for me."

More Interesting Information About Baltimore County Christian Workcamp

If you are "planning" to volunteer, but have not yet completed the registration form, please let Steve Lippy or Glenn Keatts know of your plans, so that they can add your name to their list as they continue to establish the teams for the various jobs.

Glenn Keatts and Steve Lippy have looked at a potential BCCW work site in Gwynn Oak and have said that Hunt's would take the lead. Due to the size of the ramp system, we will need more volunteers than at any of our site in previous years; it is long enough that three subcrews could work concurrently, as well as having two individuals assigned to just sawing the lumber and two to just initially auguring holes. (Purchasing and delivering all of the lumber in itself will be a challenge.) To increase the chance of getting the project finished they would like to do a major initial push for the first three days with the maximum possible number of volunteers. This project would probably wind up being the largest and most expensive BCCW ramp ever, albeit neither the highest nor the most complex. Part of the site will be in shade; tree roots should not be a problem, though there is a rock outcropping to work around.

Please let Glenn or Steve know if you can help with this ramp, so they know how to plan and how many other volunteers they will need to recruit to augment our Hunt's crew in order to have a sufficient number of workers.

Also, whether your work or not, if you have a mitre saw which can cut 4 x 4s and 2 x 6s and could lend it to the crew, it would be appreciated.


