Workcamp, our team from Hunt's, along with the help of others, built an accessible ramp which measured 164 feet long. That's a very long ramp! The success of this adventure did not materialize out of thin air. Rather, the achievement of this goal came to fruition because of the work of many people who possessed different kinds of gifts. 

2016 Baltimore County Christian Workcamp (BCCW) Week

The 2016 BCCW, our 33^{rd} year, is "history." (Our "12-month year" essentially "terminates" at the end of our BCCW week.)



General: At Hunt's, on Sunday July 17, we had our last planning meeting prior to the workweek, a successful silent auction, a good dinner with 85-90 in attendance, and then orientation, primarily via a DVD. Each morning, 30-50 of the BCCW volunteers gathered at Hunt's for breakfast prepared by a different church each morning, made our lunches, then headed out to one of the twenty-six (26) sites worked on during the week. Each night 20-65 of us went to a different church in the evening for dinner and a discussion of the work done that day. On Friday, we saw a slide show of all of the work done from Monday-Thursday, had a good "Asian" dinner, discussed sites, awards were given, and we agreed that there should be a 34th annual BCCW. At the conclusion, there was a communion service. (Glenn was presented with a "Crew Chef" BCCW shirt. All of the women who worked on ramps get to share the "coveted" annual Ramp Award.) Some statistics are as follows: Of the 66 sites referred to BCCW in the past year, 41 were completed (26 actually during BCCW week), 10 were partially done, 9 were on-hold, and 4 were submitted too late.

"Hunt's site": In June, Glenn Keatts and I twice visited a ramp site in Gwynn Oak to assess whether we could do it; the notes on it stated that it might not be possible or reasonable to do it. Not possible due to how long or complex it would need to be; not reasonable due to the resources (i.e., cost and number of man/woman power needed to build it. Notwithstanding, we decided that the ramp system could be built and that we should undertake it, though we initially did not know if we could finish it within the week. There was a definite need for the ramp: the resident had not been out of her house for several years and could not go to doctor appointments. We then needed to try to assemble a sufficient size crew. Many Hunt's members did say they would help, but we had to augment our members with other volunteers.

To save time and the back breaking work of choosing and loading lumber by hand, Glenn pre-ordered the lumber and then had Home Depot band and load over 8,000 pounds of lumber onto his trailer on Saturday July 16. On Sunday, he picked up the gasoline-powered post hole auger, so we would be ready to start when we got to the site on Monday. With additional help from members of Wards Chapel UMC, Halethorpe/Relay UMC, Catonsville UMC, and St. William of York RCC, our total crew size at the site varied from 9-16, depending on the day and time; the assistance from these non-Hunt's members enabled us to complete the ramp.

Yes, most days it was hot and most days, humid; however, it did not rain which would have curtailed work, albeit it was threatening at the end of one day. Notwithstanding, the group worked as a team in finishing the ramp system by early Friday afternoon. As with most projects, there were unexpected snags and issues, but they were overcome and we were **SUCCESSFUL!**

This ramp system was the <u>longest and most expensive in BCCW's history</u>: a total length of 164.4' (exclusive of four steps to the back landing), consisting of a back ramp (20' long with one landing) connecting into a "boardwalk" ramp (99' long with a few bends, only 4-7" above the ground) connecting to a front ramp (40' long with two landings, one of which was a double landing) which ended at a driveway. There were 46 posts (40 post holes drilled into the ground) and almost 8,000 pounds of lumber used. An estimated 57 work days were put into the ramp, approximately 415 hours, exclusive of over 24 hours in prior site visits, planning, and lumber purchase. The approximate cost was \$2,425 for the ramp; the entire cost was covered by Hunt's via donations and the Carroll-Gill's Endowment Fund. Eventually, many of the photographs will be posted on Hunt's website and a power point show will be done, as well some will be on

the Missions bulletin board.

Notwithstanding, all the sweat and aches and pains during the week, it was worth it; because, around Friday 2:30 pm, the homeowner, Bernice, was pushed down the ramp by her nurse and we could experience and be part of her overwhelming JOY! while she was praising Jesus and crying the entire time. At the end of the ramp, there was an impromptu mini-service as we held hands and Gary and Bernice both prayed. (We had been told a few days earlier that in anticipation of having the ramp done, she had already made a doctor's appointment for the following week.)

THANK YOU to HUNT'S and EVERYONE WHO HELPED (This BCCW outreach mission project has truly become a church-wide event with participation by so many.) (I apologize if any names were inadvertently missed, plus there were probably actions that I was not even aware of.):

- Approval by the Missions Committee and Church Council for Hunt's to be once again the BCCW host church
- All those who donated through the Advent and Lenten offerings, as well as those who made separate, specific donations to BCCW, plus the \$2,000 donation from the Carroll-Gill's Endowment Fund.
- All those who donated items to be auctioned at the silent auction [Carol and Andy Anders, Charlotte Douglas, Marcia Conlin, Linda Flavin, Linda Keatts, Shirley Lin, Caryl and Ron Peterson (the bid on their Annapolis condo was almost half of the total profit from the auction!), Nancy Powers, and Cynthia Sparks; as a well as a visitor to Hunt's, Nancy Lingar]
- Those who helped set up chairs and tables, and took down walls on Sunday morning
- Those who did registration on Sunday (Bob Dey and Mary Ellen Lippy)
- Those who attended the silent auction (and bid!)
- Those who prepared breakfast on Monday morning [Jody Waters (who has been coordinating the Monday breakfast for many, many years), assisted by Robin Bosley, Shirley Lin, Mary Ellen Lippy, Ellie Lott, Ron Peterson, and Susan Schubert]
- Those who donated goodies for the lunches (Linda Keatts, Mary Ellen Lippy, and Nancy Powers)
- Those who donated tools (Robert Sparks and Dave McMillan)
- Those who actually toiled out in the sun for the week at the ramp site [all 5 days—Bruce Douglas, Linda and Glenn Keatts, Steve Lippy, David McMillan (his first year!), and Diane Paulson; 4 days—Alan MacEwen (his first year!) and Pastor Gary Sheffield-James; Dave (the father) McMillan, Keith McMillan, Christopher Regan, and Melissa Regan.
- As the photographer for all of the BCCW sites, Howard Lin who "worked" all five days too.
- Special thanks to Glenn Keatts, who as our crew chief, designed the ramp, ordered and transported the lumber and a myriad of necessary supplies and tools from his workshop, including providing uniquely designed and fabricated guides to facilitate installation, such as for the middle rail, cutting off the tops of 4x4s, post hole locator, etc.; and then, during the week, had to try and "herd cats" (i.e., his crew) and tolerate our inability to understand "Glenn speak."




Photographers Are Coming!



 - 5 cans of tuna fish






September Missions –

Dear Church Members and Representatives,

Recently I sent an e-mail explaining the challenges of providing food to the many clients at the Center. It requires many hours of Volunteer labor, collecting, sorting, dating, shopping and disbursing the food needed at the Center. This does not include the coordination of Community organizations who are interested in doing large Food Drives and need the help of Volunteers from the Center.

One of the ways you can support the Center in this very important outreach to our Community is to be part of our Corps of Volunteers who are willing to serve at least one or two days a month in one of the areas of our food ministry. I have developed a form (enclosed) that clearly outlines the different areas where we need more support and what is required for each task. If we can recruit enough workers, it may mean you will only have to work one or two days a month. If you are willing to work more, we can always use you as a sub for areas we are short workers. Of course, we are always in need of extra help during the Holiday Season when food donations peak.

Adequate Volunteer support in this area is very important to the health of the Center for many reasons. It insures that the Center will always be stocked and ready to meet the needs of our Clients. It allows the paid staff to concentrate on issues such as Center operations, Volunteer Training, Program Development and Coordination, recruitment, fundraising and outreach. Many of these jobs can be done outside the hours that the Center is open which opens up Volunteer opportunities to those who can't serve between 10 am and 3pm. It also opens a possibility for Saturday service once a month.

Please open this invitation to serve our Community to friends and neighbors who are looking for Volunteer opportunities. Our goal is to build a large Corps of willing Volunteers to support the work of the Center and to insure that we will not only be able to continue this important outreach at our current level but to expand it.


