

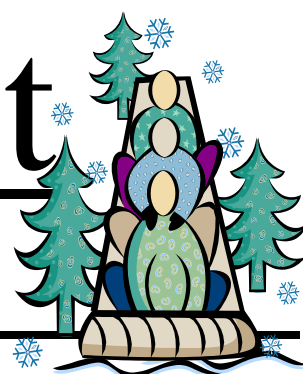

To the saints at Hunt's Memorial United Methodist Church –

Grace to you and peace from the Lord Jesus Christ, from God his father and ours, and the Holy Spirit that binds, directs, and sustains us all. Ever since last fall, I have been diligently seeking to understand God's will for Hunts in light of our expressed desire to grow into a stronger, larger, more capable congregation.

In October, I shared that I had come to the following conclusion: churches grow because of focused energy and enthusiasm. Along with the phrase "yes, but how" brings us to the question of how we focus energy and enthusiasm. Some of the answers I have been discovering in my prayer life are becoming evident. An active and regular children's choir, for instance. I cannot help but smile when I think of the two performances our children have already given, and the enthusiasm that generates both within the children themselves but also within the congregation. Similarly, some of the things we are doing that seem to be helping have been either accidental or spirit gifted, if you prefer – things like First Thursdays and the Happy Hour group – that bring people together and help us to build community, which helps us to become better connected. Better connected people get more excited about seeing each other and encouraging one another.

These may or may not seem like big steps, and perhaps they aren't. Still, I cannot help but feel positive that we have weathered a pastoral transition here without a significant drop-off. Every change brings both good and bad things. It is common for the "losers" to feel their pain much more quickly than the "winners" discover enthusiasm and growth. That is the price of transitions in general. Here at Hunt's, however, we have not experienced a significant drop off of attendance or giving, for which I am grateful.

The question I now ask myself is this: "are we ready for a bigger change?" Change is, as noted, always hard. Still, growth in congregational attendance, outreach, and energy in big ways will require bigger changes – are we ready? This question isn't asked academically. There are some things we can do to generate energy and enthusiasm – to focus our attention together on some specific projects that could really change the way we do things and bring new possibilities into play. These changes will not happen accidentally, however, nor will they happen without serious growth pains. Changes to sacred spaces, to our common practices, to our ways of being and doing will change our experiences together, sometimes for the better, we hope, but surely causing stress and loss along the way. Is this the time for this kind of focus?

If it is – and I am still very much prayerfully asking the "are we ready" question – then what projects could we tackle as ways to focus our energy and enthusiasm toward growth? Some suggestions for you to prayerfully consider (in no particular order):

- Addition/conversion of a space on the first floor for fellowship and/or a cry room to enable our friendly congregation to actually welcome each other more effectively.
- Creation of a functional "greeting area" at the front door to allow us to discuss and greet each other properly inside, avoiding the vagaries of weather.
- Hiring of a new staff person to enhance our Christian Formation and Group formation within the congregation – not because we are bad at either, but more focus in both could help us.
- Replacement of the roof (not sexy, but leaks are a bummer).
- Enhancing the technology base for the church and congregation (wifi in the sanctuary, permanent screen access that doesn't cut off the choir in our sanctuary, video recording/livestreaming, cry room, nursery, kitchen, and VanMetre Hall video streaming capacity, enhanced lighting in the parking lot and around the building, data connections between church and Agape, etc.)
- Fit and finish improvements to paint, flooring, finishes, etc. throughout the main building, especially on the first floor (some of the present "presentation" leaves a little to be desired, for instance).

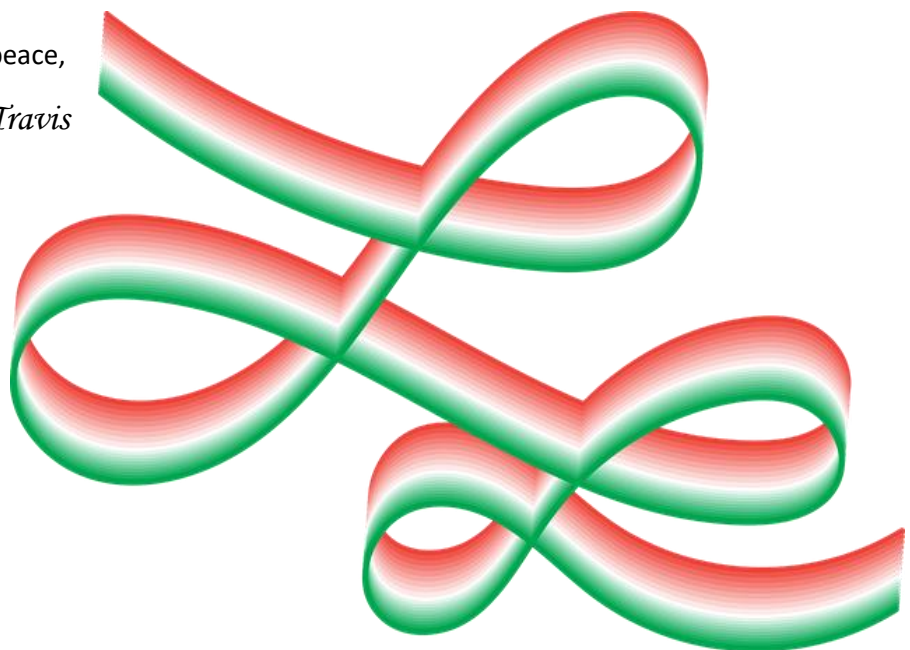
This list could be expanded greatly, of course, and must be refined and defined before we can collectively focus any energy or attention on these projects. I return to the beginning, however – are we ready for something like this? If we are, when should we get started dreaming, visioning, and focusing? The church council and leadership are asking these very questions. Please pray for us as we seek God's guidance in this discernment process.

One common feature of each of these items is that they cost more than our budget will allow in our ordinary operation – thus they would require that we start a special project to raise funds for these or other similar projects. A capital or perhaps comprehensive campaign to allow some or all of these to occur would be required. First, before we get there, of course, is the prayerful act of discernment – are we ready for this, and if so, what projects should we prioritize – must be asked first.

Pray for our leadership as we ask these very questions.

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## A Moment in Time...1773

Hunt's congregation has had uninterrupted existence since 1773. It traces its roots back to the Methodist Society that began meeting at the house of Phineas Hunt, the progenitor of our Church.

Though we have no actual information as to exactly when the Methodists began meeting at Hunt's home, we do know that in Francis Asbury's journal entry dated **Friday, September 3, 1773** he mentions preaching at the home of Phineas Hunt. By this date, Hunt's home, located just west of the present-day Church, was a station on the Baltimore Circuit.

We also know that less than a month and a half earlier, on **July 26, 1773**, Phineas' mother, *Elizabeth Chew Smith Hunt*, transferred all of her real and personal property including dwelling and outbuildings to her youngest two sons, Phineas and his brother, Samuel. This was done due to her approaching marriage to third husband, John Bond. She had been married first to Walter Smith (Sr.) who died in 1743, and then second to Job Hunt who died in 1753. Most likely, the dwelling mentioned is the Hunt family home on Joppa Road where the Methodist Society was meeting in 1773.

And prior to this, on **February 18, 1772**, Walter Smith (Jr.), the only son of Elizabeth and her first husband, Walter Smith (Sr.), died unmarried leaving his Baltimore County properties and inheritance divided among his four Hunt half-brothers. At this point, Phineas at age 20 would have become a land owner with a source of income.

So most likely, though unproven, the Methodist classes started meeting at the home of Phineas Hunt the summer of 1773, the chosen date for the beginning of our congregation.

The 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Hunt's Memorial United Methodist Church  
will be celebrated in 2023.

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**Samuel Chew Hunt** was born January 30, 1749 in Calvert County, Maryland. He died June 3, 1839 in his 90<sup>th</sup> year in Baltimore County. Samuel was the third son of Job Hunt (2<sup>nd</sup>) and his wife, Elizabeth Chew Smith Hunt. He had the following siblings: half-brother Walter Smith (b. 1739), son of Elizabeth Chew and her first husband Walter Smith (Sr.); brother Henry Hunt (b. 1745); brother Job Hunt (3<sup>rd</sup>) (b. 1747); and younger brother Phineas Hunt (b. 1751), the progenitor of our Church which bears his family's name.

Sometime following the death of his father in 1753, Samuel and his brothers, Job and Phineas, moved with their mother to the Green Spring Valley area of Baltimore County where his half-brother Walter Smith owned several tracts of land which he had inherited from his father. In 1772, Walter died unmarried leaving his property and inheritance to his mother and three younger half-brothers: Job, Samuel, and Phineas Hunt.

On February 9, 1777, Samuel Hunt married Wilhelmina Gott, the daughter of Samuel Gott and Rachael Norwood. Some years later, his brother Phineas also married in the Gott Family, marrying Susanna Gott, Wilhelmina's younger sister. The Gotts were a notable colonial era family owning what would today be described as land encompassing all of west Towson.

By 1798, Samuel Hunt owned part of the land tract called *The Groves*, and part of the tract called *Selsed*, comprising about 314 acres running from the present day Riderwood area toward Towson, and encompassing what is now the Kenilworth Mall area.

Samuel and his wife had just one child, a son, Benedict Hunt, born in 1783. Benedict died September 11, 1825, preceding his father by 14 years. Benedict had married Prudence Cockey and had 9 children. Following his son's death, Samuel took on the responsibility of helping to raise these grandchildren.

In 1900, Mrs. Rebecca Rider, by then a longtime member of Hunt's Church, remembered Phineas and Samuel Hunt from when she was a little girl. She noted that Phineas and his brother Samuel, who had also been active in the Church, usually sat side by side near the front of the sanctuary during worship services. She recalled that as a child, she heard much of the "upright religious characters" of both brothers and how they had "laid the foundations upon which others have builded the walls of Zion."

Anyone wishing to participate in a gift exchange is asked to bring a Christmas stocking filled with items (\$10 limit).

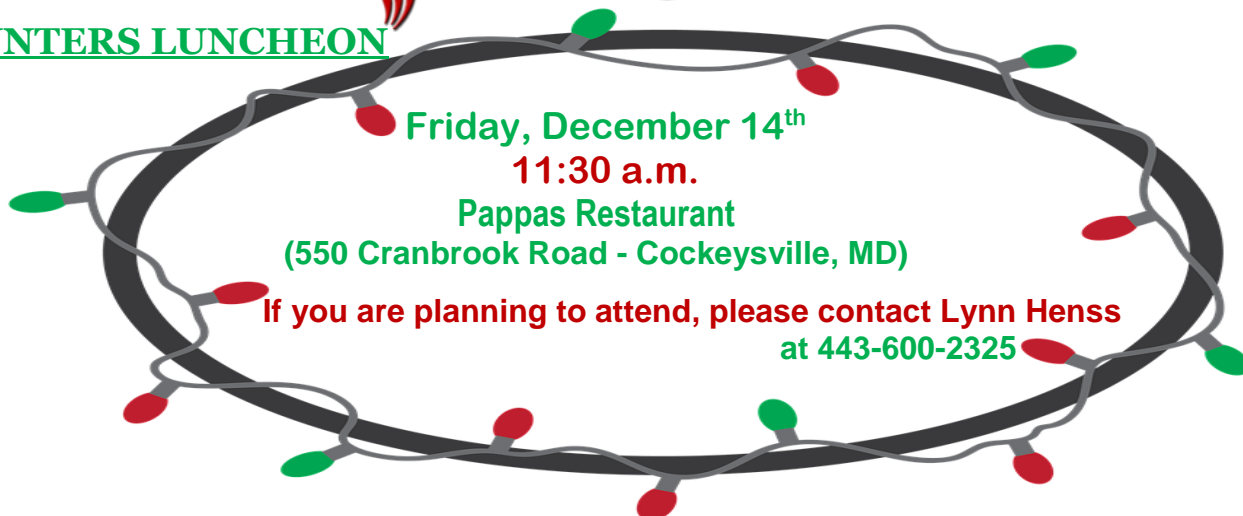

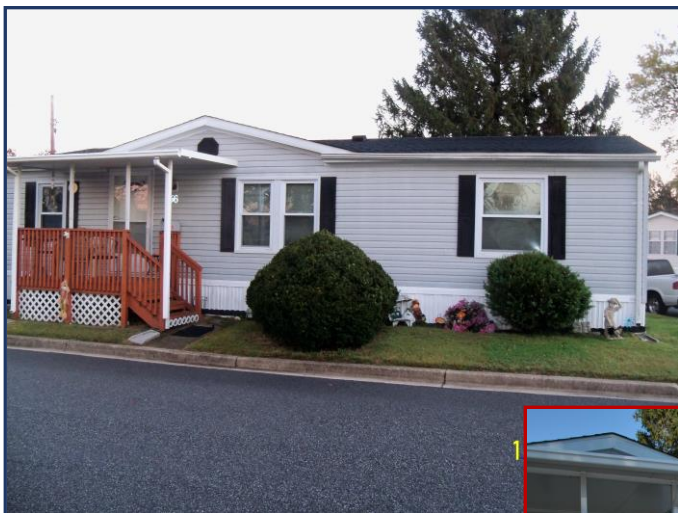

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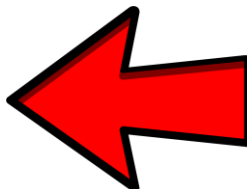
## **BCCW October Ramp** **which became the November Ramp**

Finally, on November 7-8, during the busy getting ready for Hunt's turkey time, we were able to work on the ramp in a trailer park in Dundalk. The Baltimore County Christian Workcamp (BCCW) was not able to get to it in July; as a result, Glenn Keatts agreed to be the crew chief to see that it got built.

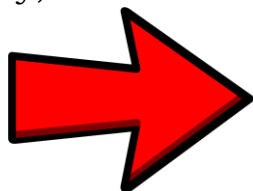
We missed a lot of great working days in October due to Glenn's difficulty in getting the trailer park management to approve the ramp design; thus, the October ramp became the November ramp. We initially scheduled it on November 8-9, but the weather forecast for that Friday deteriorated; consequently, we rescheduled it to Wednesday and Thursday. Wednesday's weather was good, but Thursday was even better. (Friday was wet in the afternoon, so it was a good call.)



We started the work at 6:45 a.m.  
on Wednesday, November 7<sup>th</sup>...



...and we were done by 2:00 p.m.  
the next day;



The estimated total number of hours on the site was about 140. We had volunteers coming and leaving on staggered hours; we maxed out at 10 volunteers on Wednesday and 12 on Thursday. It was surprising (or just a coincidence?) how we always maxed out around lunch time when the pizza was there.

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**Thanks** to the following Hunt's folks who were there for one day, two days, and parts thereof, in alphabetical order: Bill Band, Glenn Keatts, Travis Knoll, Steve Lippy, Lizzie McMillan, Keith McMillan, Diane Paulson, and Melissa Regan. Howard Lin (our Hunt's and BCCW photographer) made an appearance at lunch time (in time for pizza!) on the first day, as well as at the completion. Our crew was supplemented by eight others, including the Scancellia clan (ages approximately 6, 8, and 10; as well as their father and his father-in-law).

The biggest problem, besides getting management approval, was Glenn's difficulty in procuring the necessary lumber on that Tuesday; he can provide you with details on that saga. During the ramp building, the largest obstacle was removing the stump of a large bush; it took a determined effort by a few, with the most grit shown by Lizzie. In her honor, it has been referred to as "Lizzie's stump," which Travis hauled back to Hunt's. A real advantage of all of the wet weather this year was that the 14 post holes dug were the easiest we ever had to dig. Each was dug in less than two minutes and often without using a digging bar. We had an abnormal additional amount of other digging to do too, which was much aided by the wet sub-soils.



The final product, including shortening the storm door, placing a porch over the existing porch, and two landings, totaled 56-feet. Because we could not take the ramp into the street, we opted to place two vertical grab bars at the end of the ramp adjacent to the curb; ... a unique addition.

The client who uses a walker did try out the ramp and was able to navigate that last step when leaving (a.k.a., the first step when arriving). She said she was in "7th heaven," as she was able to get out of her house on her own and will be able to walk with her walker around her trailer park.

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## FOOD FOR THOUGHT

Since February 2016, Hunt's has participated in the Food for Thought Baltimore County (FFT) program, which provides weekend backpacks of nutritious, shelf-stable food to homeless and/or food insecure students. We started with 5 students at Dumbarton Middle School. Last school year we served 8 students a week at Dumbarton and for school year 2018-2019, that number is now 10 per week. In addition, we provide 16 food backpacks a month to students at Ridge Ruxton, a special education school that serves students with significant developmental delays and/or multiple disabilities. While the students we serve at Ridge Ruxton are not necessarily classified as homeless, they are at risk. The poverty rate at the school is 46%; most families are emotionally and financially fatigued with the stress of addressing their disabled child's multiple needs and are grateful to have food supplies for the weekend.



We fill 56 backpacks at Agape House on the last Saturday of each month. Everyone is welcome to participate. As part of that effort, we owe a shout out to the mid-highs, who fill Ziploc bags with fruit cups and applesauce on the third Sunday of each month. The bags are delivered every Thursday morning to Dumbarton and at the beginning of each month to Ridge Ruxton.

The cost of each food backpack is approximately \$8.50 - \$10. We have received food items and several generous cash donations since July, including from Finley Permison (age 9), who has collected \$45.19 this school year toward this mission. But we still need your help! You can help by donating food items (a list of needed items will be printed in the weekly church bulletin) or you can give cash or write a check (put FFT in the memo line) and we'll do the shopping (FFT is the designated mission for the January special collection).

We're also looking for \$10 or \$20 Giant gift cards by December 16<sup>th</sup>, so that we can give the 10 Dumbarton students each \$50 worth of gift cards to help them eat during the winter break.



We are grateful for the donations we have been receiving every week and we thank the congregation for its continuing generosity and support of this important mission. We believe no child should ever go hungry. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact Marcia Conlin or Merle Bayne.

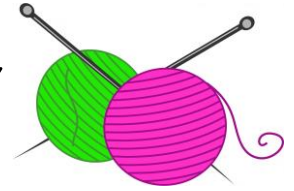

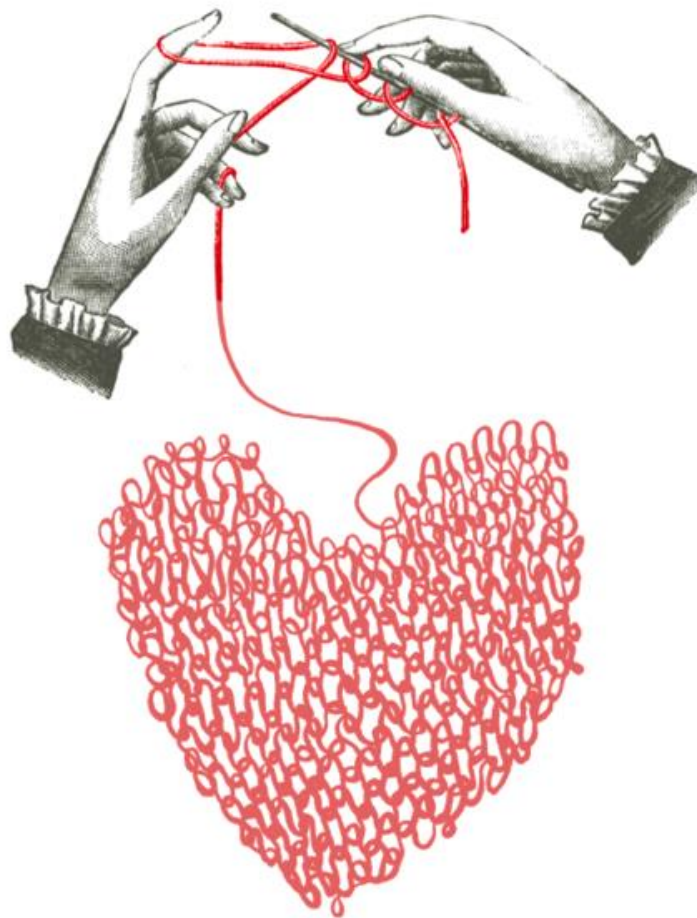
We have copies of our basic patterns available in the narthex of the church building.
