To the saints at Hunt's Memorial UMC,

A Moment in Time ... 1962

Currently at Sunday worship services, we are blessed to have Cheryl Warren (our pianist) and Patrick Weikle (our choir director) provide us with beautiful music, both piano and organ. While enjoying their skills in Church recently, I heard some around me remark, "Isn't it nice to hear the organ along with the piano again on Sundays?" Agreeing with the appreciation being expressed, I decided to do some research on Hunt's pipe organ to share with you.





On Thursday, April 16, 1962, Hunt's sanctuary was partially destroyed by fire. The damage was concentrated around the organ loft, pulpit, and choir area. Among the things needing to be replaced was the church organ. As recalled in a 1986 interview with then longtime organist Beverly Gill, the fire had damaged the organ beyond repair and a new Wicks organ was installed as part of the restoration work. She explained that the new organ was a 3-rank organ, meaning 3 ranks of pipes with two keyboards. In 1983, Bev said the congregation decided to improve the organ by adding a fourth rank of pipes and chimes. Bev said the chimes soon became a favorite of hers. This 1962 Wicks organ with its 1983 improvements is the one still in use at Hunt's today.

Bev also recalled that following the 1962 fire many church members wanted to purchase an electronic organ. She said she and a few other members pushed hard to keep a pipe organ in the Church. When it was found that a demonstration model Wicks could be purchased at a reasonable price, the Church agreed to purchase the Wicks organ. On Sunday, September 16, 1962, the restored sanctuary and its new pipe organ were consecrated. The dedication service's program from that morning lists Clifton D. Cunningham as minister; V. Linwood England as lay leader; Miss Shirley Sekinger as choir leader; and Mrs. Charles Gill, Jr. as organist.

In a recent conversation, our current choir director Patrick Weikle shared that he was teaching himself to play the organ and had only been playing for about a year and a half. He agreed how fortunate it was that back in 1962 Hunt's decided to purchase the pipe organ instead of an electronic one. And when asked about a favorite aspect of playing the organ, he too said it was hearing the chimes. I think many of us in the congregation would agree.

Note: Beverly (Howard) Gill, born and raised in Riderwood, was a part of Hunt's Church since birth. At age 15 she began playing the Church organ, and at age 16 became the official church organist. As friends recounted at her memorial service, by the time of her death in 1996 Bev had played for 8 different ministers, numerous choir directors, contributed to all the youth services, Thursday night choir rehearsals, hundreds of funerals, numerous weddings, and 44 years of Sunday worship services.

2019 Financial Performance – The Year in Review!

Throughout 2019, I provided updates on our financial picture as it related to our operating budget. I now want to provide you with a final reporting for the year.

In a welcome development, November's and December's offerings were strong versus budget and 2018, helping us significantly reduce the projected shortfall. As a result, the shortfall for the year was only \$2,632 versus a budgeted shortfall of \$33,494.

For the year, income benefited by a larger-than-budgeted payment from the preschool program (\$61,000 vs \$47,000). Offerings for the year were approximately \$8,000 below budget and flat with the previous year at around \$300,000. On the expense side, tight expense management in areas like Christian Education and Church Property resulted in spending lower than what was budgeted.

I would also note that your support of our mission programs continues to be impressive – income of over \$34,000 was received to help support a wide range of programs, including Food For Thought, Helping Up Mission, UMCOR, Board of Child Care, ACTC, Baltimore County Christian Workcamp, Earl's Place, and Camp Hope. Many lives were touched by your generosity.

While the 2019 results were much better than expected, our financial challenges remain, and much work needs to be done to put the church on a firmer financial foundation. The operating budget for 2020 adopted by the Church Council in January reflects another expected shortfall of greater than \$30,000. As I have mentioned before, I don't believe we have a spending problem. Instead, we are challenged by a decline in our membership and flat offerings (three years around \$300,000). In 2020, let's grow both the number of people worshipping within our walls and our giving.

I also wanted to update you on our Pledge Campaign, part of the Stewardship Campaign that was held in November with the theme "God Loves a Cheerful Giver" (see 2 Corinthians 9:6-7). As of the end of the year, 35 pledges were received with a commitment of \$176,192. The number of pledges represented a 33% decrease from the prior year. There is still time to make a pledge – please contact Beth Woody in the church office for a form. The benefit of a pledge campaign is that it gives the Church Council a sense of the funds the church can count on for the year ahead. While we know not everyone who gives pledges, but it is one of the inputs we use to plan our expenditures and commitments for the year.

Did you know how easy it is to give electronically? If you go to our website (www.huntsumc.org) and select "My Offering" under the Stewardship tab, you will find an easy process to give. In fact, you can sign up to give a one-time gift or establish a recurring gift. Imagine, you can set it up once and not have to stress about having your offering ready every Sunday morning or feel guilty when you are away from church due to vacation or illness. Almost 20% of our offering is received this way. Please consider helping us increase this to 40%. Thank you.

Finally, please mark your calendars for March 1st. On this day, I will hold a financial discussion after each of the morning services, where I will review the financial condition of our church and how it has changed over time. These sessions will be similar to those held last February. It is a goal of the Finance Committee to ensure every member and supporter of Hunt's Church has an opportunity to learn about and understand the church's finances. We will review the church's assets and liabilities, last year's results, and this year's budget. Please plan to attend.

Please continue to pray for the financial health of our church, so we can continue doing God's work in the community and around the world. We would also ask that you pray and reflect on how you can best support the church in 2020 using the time, talents, and treasure God has provided you. Thank you.

Happy New Year!




We have had a very busy few months at the preschool.

In 2019, we had a very successful year with our May food collection and our Thanksgiving Bags in November. Members of Hunt's are continuing to be generous to our neighbors in need. Baltimore County Christian Workcamp is planning the 37th annual workcamp from July 19-24, 2020, once again based at Hunt's Church. BCCW has started to plan next July's projects. Food for Thought We continue to deliver 10 bags of food each week to Dumbarton Middle School to provide 2 breakfast, 2 lunch and 2 dinner meals to 10 students over the weekend. And thanks to the generosity of the congregation, each of those students received a \$50 Walmart gift card to help feed them during the winter school break. We also provided 16 bags containing two different dinner meal items to Ridge Ruxton School in January to help out 8 families. Thank you, thank you, thank you all for your continued support of this mission. The next date for filling the food bags is Saturday, February 22nd, at 1:00 p.m. at the Agapé House.

Earl's Place We provided Christmas gifts for 24 children and grandchildren of the men at Earl's Place, who were extremely grateful, and delivered several dozen cookies to help feed the crowd at the Earl's Place Resolution Run on January 1st. The men continue to enjoy and devour the monthly casseroles. Just a reminder - the name of the umbrella organization that operates Earl's Place has changed from United Ministries, Inc. to Cornerstone Community Housing.

Earl's Place continues to benefit from the casserole ministry and the men are so grateful. The Earl's Place elves bought the men gifts to give their children or grandchildren on Christmas. They were so excited to get these gifts, because they do not have funds to buy gifts. (SEE PICTURE)



Santa's Helpers On behalf of the church, the Missions Committee bought Christmas gifts for a 10-year-old pediatric cancer patient and his four siblings who were spending the holidays at the Ronald McDonald House in Baltimore. The shopping elves had some trouble finding a particular Nerf gun that had been requested by the patient but trust that all went well! We're grateful that we were able to share our blessings with this family.

Helping Up Mission In late November, they were 10 million dollars away from their stretch goal of 61 million goal for the women's center. They are hoping to open in the fall of 2021. Now they are serving 20 women at the spiritual recovery center on Chase Street and still serve around 40 per day with other services at Chase, such as detox, drug rehab classes and shelter.

They are running a little behind of their goal for of 1.2 million dollars for unexpected day-to-day expenses, programs and services for the men and women that come through the doors looking for hope. Let's hope there is good news when we get an update

Shoe Box Ministry Hats off to Amy Black who worked so hard to get 150 shoe boxes filled with goodies and hats and gloves for the Head Start program in Baltimore city. Many thanks to everyone who donated hats and gloves.

Casserole Ministry Please keep those casseroles coming. Look for some new recipes from Samantha, who is going to start tracking the numbers. She hosted a cook-off and the group made 15 huge casseroles. Maybe we can do a cook-off at church in the spring.

Cookies for Kids



During the month of **FEBRUARY**, Hunt's Church has been asked to provide cookies as a special treat for the children at the **Board of Child Care** which is located right here in Baltimore County (just off Liberty Road – just outside the Beltway). There are cottages where the children live, a school, a chapel, an administrative building, a dining hall/kitchen, play areas, etc. They provide a safe haven for children who cannot live at home for various reasons.

So, we need cookies!!! Homemade, store-bought, prepackaged (all those Girl Scout cookies you bought and didn't eat!), anything that you think children will enjoy! If you donate "gluten-free," "sugar-free" or "peanut-free" cookies, please make sure that they are clearly designated with these specifications.

We plan to deliver 100% of the cookies on Sunday, February 23rd (right after the 10 a.m. worship service).

So please being them in and put them in the labeled bin in the Coat Room.

Last year (2019), we collected <u>386</u> dozen cookies (an all-time high record). Can we set a new record this year? Thanks in advance for all your help in making things a bit nicer for the children at the Board of Child Care.

Gratitude to all for a wonderful 2019 ACTC Thanksgiving Basket Project!

Excerpts from Linda's letter:

• We are so grateful to all of you who helped us come together to provide Thanksgiving to so many in our area. Together, we gathered 2,417 Thanksgiving bags filled with food.



- On Thursday and Friday, we gave out 1,612 of these bags to 24 area agencies that serve the county and city. Two examples are Lutheran Missions and Prologue, Inc. We then provided 678 families who walked in on Monday and Tuesday of Thanksgiving week, and received a bag and a turkey or gift cards towards a turkey.
- This year we had 605 turkeys to give to families!
- We gave away many other good things: candy, books, makeup, household items, other fresh foods and baked goods, stationary and festive napkins and so forth.
- We set aside 75 to give away at Christmas, and the remaining 52 we broke down to put into our regular food stream. We received many other donations of additional non-perishable food over the course of the week and into the following week. Last quarter, we gave an average of 4.5 tons of food a week from ACTC's pantry. That is an incredible amount of food, and we are so grateful to our volunteers and donors for making this possible.

It's Still About Your Church

I am ready to admit something I've been in denial about for a long time. Even though I've invested a great deal of blood, sweat and tears trying, I simply cannot fix what's broken in the United Methodist Church. I can't fix the polarization that now imprisons us. I can't fix the outcome of this May's General Conference. And I can't fix the uncertainty we face as a church.

Even more significantly, the Holy Spirit has helped me realize I don't have to fix the church. It belongs to Jesus, and he's got it covered. This doesn't mean I'm stepping back, shrugging my shoulders and saying, "It's going to be what it's going to be." Rather, I will be focusing on what Jesus is calling every United Methodist congregation in Arkansas to do – becoming the most Jesus loving, disciple-making and sharing Jesus' love church you can be. I love the United Methodist Church and the way of being Christian it shares. But ultimately, local congregations matter more than denominations – even our beloved United Methodist denomination. People need your local church, not a denomination. Your community needs your local church, not a denomination. And most importantly, Jesus needs your local church, not a denomination.

This means the single most pressing task is enabling your church that has a unique location, is filled with a unique group of people and possesses a unique history to become the church Jesus wants you to be – a vital congregation that makes disciples of Jesus Christ, who make disciples equipped and sent to transform lives, communities and the world.

Embrace your identity. Your church is literally the Body of Christ. So act like it! Love Jesus, follow Jesus, grow in Jesus, be transformed in Jesus and share Jesus in ways that make it clear whose you are. Get serious about investing in those things that form you as the Body of Christ: prayer, Bible study, involving people in intentional discipling groups and reaching out to your neighborhood in ways that touch real people in real ways with real love.

Live out your purpose. Jesus uses your church, and the disciples in it, to continue his mission of making disciples, forming disciples, and equipping and sending disciples to transform lives, communities and the world. Help people discover their spiritual gifts, bless them and then unleash them in your congregation and into the mission field that begins right outside the doors of your sanctuary.

Demonstrate the difference Jesus makes. Almost every congregation has figured out how to thrive with a diverse group of people who have perspectives that are diametrically opposed. Don't see this as a problem; see it as a wonderful opportunity to show how Jesus brings together people who normally wouldn't give each other the time of day. Keep people worshiping together on the same pew, praying together, studying together, serving together and caring for each other.

I want to be absolutely clear about something that some people may consider to be a scandalous idea. Yet I am convicted of its truth. The future of your church is not dependent upon what happens in the United Methodist Church. Don't let the uncertainty, or brokenness, paralyze you. Move ahead boldly and confidently. Your church will still be part of the Body of Christ. Your church will still make disciples of Jesus Christ. Your church will still form deeper disciples. And your church will still equip and send disciples to transform lives, communities and the world.

The painful reality is that we United Methodist Christians face an uncertain future. As Jesus leads us toward it, I want you to know something. I consider it an honor and a privilege to walk with you. I believe in you. I trust you. And, most importantly, I love you.
