Make a meal, write a note, meet some need for a friend, neighbor, family member, team member, classmate, etc.


I - Intentionally Pray

Moment in Time...Spring 1986

For the past 34 years, beautiful handcrafted kneeling pads have graced our church railing. Each needlepoint kneeler depicts a separate Christian attribute- *love*, *joy*, *peace*, *patience*, *kindness*, *goodness*, *faithfulness*, *gentleness*, *and self-control*

In 1982, when the Memorial Committee and then pastor Reverend VanMetre met to discuss kneelers for the church, these nine attributes were chosen as the perfect theme. Called the "fruit of the Spirit" in Galatians chapter 5, these qualities seemed to typify the enduring Christian fellowship of Hunt's.



Mrs. Billie Conkling, an authority on church needlepoint, was engaged to design the canvasses. To further personalize the theme, the blue morning glory flower seen in our stained-glass window was selected to wind through each kneeler, while the

reddish undertone of Christ's robe was chosen for the lettering.

By September 1983, church members had financed the project by offering the kneelers as memorials and honorariums, and volunteers were ready to begin stitching.



In March 1986, after many hours of patient, loving work, all of the kneelers were completed. A dedication Sunday, March 9, 1986, was set aside to personally thank each worker and donor. On Sunday May 2, 1986, the kneelers were installed in place, and a special dedication service was offered in thanksgiving. A special album highlighting all involved in this wonderful project was compiled and placed on display in the Bicentennial Parlor.

Since the spring of 1986, we at Hunt's have been privileged to use these beautiful works of religious art each time we kneel along the railing at the altar. As we continue to serve and honor God, may the "fruit of the Spirit" be among us for many years to come.

During the summer of 2016, the Reverend Gary Sheffield-James gave a series of sermons on each of the "Fruits of the Spirit." On Sunday, August 28th, the thirty-year anniversary of the dedication, the women who beautifully crafted the needlepoint stitching on the kneelers were once again honored and the kneelers were re-dedicated.







Your financial support of Hunt's Church has been truly impressive during the pandemic – **THANK** YOU! Many of you have shifted to electronic giving, some have increased giving, and others are mailing checks to the church office. While we were concerned (and still remain so since no one knows how long the pandemic will last) that our giving might decrease with the pandemic, you have proven us wrong so far (this is one time we like being wrong).

Although the picture is attractive, there were about \$10,500 of expenses budgeted for April that shifted to May, so our actual performance compared to budget is a bit overstated. A good way to think of it is that our bottom line is close to budget. While the income for the first three months is strong, we can't forget it benefits from some donations of stock we received in January, which was anticipated in our budget. Although our weekly offerings are modestly trailing our budget, expenses are running below budget as well, thus offsetting the impact of the lower giving.

The Finance Committee, primarily through Rick Ehrlich's efforts, has expanded the ways to give electronically as a result of the pandemic. We added the GivePlus app (https://www.vancopayments.com/egiving/church-app) to our Vanco electronic platform, and soon (perhaps by the time you are reading this article), we will add the option to give via credit card and text-to-give. Once released, information on these two methods will be posted to the church's website (www.huntsumc.org). We encourage you to check them out and choose the method that works best for you. Of course, we also welcome checks mailed to the church office – whatever works for you. Since most of our expenses are fixed in the short run (salaries, maintenance, etc.), we need to do what we can to continue supporting the church in these challenging times, so let's keep April's momentum going into the summer - let's eliminate the traditional "summer slump" this year.

We had a Zoom graduation for our 4-year-olds on Friday, May 22nd. Each child dressed in their Sunday best, shared an illustration of their favorite thing about preschool and was recognized by the teachers. Later in the day, the teachers proceeded in parade-like-fashion to each child's house to drop-off a package with the child's diploma and a special Hunt's Church Preschool graduation shirt!

I have to say that I am so proud of my staff. Given these unseen circumstances we have come together to support each other and our families. We, as a faculty, meet on Zoom every once in a while, to catch up, plan, and support each other. Our emotions are all over the place! We truly miss being able to hug, teach in person, and enjoy our students.

I would like to send a shout-out to Ms. Pegg for her video Chapel lessons and to Jim Foster for sharing a video-book-reading with our children.

I want to thank everyone for their generosity during these difficult times. We are sending \$1500 to the Assistance Center of Towson Churches that has been donated to the church so far. A huge "Thank You" to Dave & Lisa McMillan and their family for picking up food from members of our church family and delivering it to ACTC.

We have donated \$550 to families that Jim Foster is helping in the Mondawmin project.

Thanks to the incredible generosity of the congregation, Food for Thought received over \$4800 in cash and gift cards to feed 10 Dumbarton Middle School students each weekend and to provide an evening meal every other week to 8 Ridge Ruxton School families during the 2019-2020 school year. Before schools were closed for the year on March 16, 2020, we had provided 190 weekend food bags to Dumbarton students and 92 food bags to Ridge Ruxton families. In addition, the 10 Dumbarton students were each provided with \$50 Walmart gift cards over the December break. Grocery items and gift cards on hand after March 16th were donated to the Student Support Network.

With our remaining funds, Food for Thought continues to provide financial assistance to the Ridge Ruxton School students and their families. Several of the struggling families have contacted the school counselor for help and she is looking at the unique needs of each family. At one family's request, Food for Thought provided several toys to entertain a developmentally delayed toddler as well as a \$25 Amazon gift card to help the family. We will provide an update in the next newsletter.

Hunt's Church sponsored one \$500 micro-grant and Carroll's-Gill's Permanent Endowment Fund sponsored two \$500 micro-grants.

Sometime during the month of May, I sent out an email message asking people to share any positive things that have happened to them during this pandemic.

At that time, I shared that one of the "silver linings" to working in the church office on a daily basis is that occasionally members (or friends) of our church family will call the office or come to the Agapé House to talk to me. (There is no mention of church related things.) Our casual conversation includes a myriad of topics. When the time comes to say, "Good-bye," we have both been slightly enhanced because we have shared a part of who we are with the other.

Another "silver lining" for me has been a deeper "family-type" friendship with my next-door-neighbor. (We have been friends for 20+ years.) Many evenings, we talk for a while over the backyard fence. Plus, she often makes work-lunches for me. These lunches consist of food from her dinner the night before, and they are super-delicious! It is so sweet of her to do this for me. She is an amazing cook!

Jim Foster shared that for the first time, bluebirds live in his yard. He and his wife, Mary, wanted to attract them to their yard, so they sought-out the advice of a "professional" on this subject. They were told what type of bird house to obtain (and the direction it needed to face), as well as the kind of bird food bluebirds prefer to eat. As a result, the Fosters have bluebirds and "neighborly" neighbors who gaze at the birds and chat with Jim and Mary.

Jim Foster also shared that he and Mary have a new-found interest in (and appreciation for) "classic" Best Actor/Actress Academy Award winners and their movies. (The first Academy Awards were presented on May 16, 1929 for movies from 1927 and 1928.) From the list of winners, Jim and Mary select the movies they want to watch. (Jim said that some are free, and others cost \$1-\$3 to watch.) Popcorn is also available!

Cathy Junkin shared that every Saturday night, the neighbors on their street come outside at 8:00 p.m. They stand 6-feet apart and her husband, Dave, plays his guitar while everyone sings "God Bless America" in honor of all of the healthcare workers.

Pegg Melfa shared that she has had time to stop and smell the flowers, watch ferns uncurl, listen to birdsong, and watch birds build nests during this glorious spring. She is enjoying the very creative ways people are passing time during the pandemic and connecting with others. Her greatest blessing is this special time with her family and watching her granddaughter grow. Pegg went on to say, "Every one of these sentences mention 'time' which is often the simplest and most precious blessing."



Kidder-Thomas Scholarship Fund

The Kidder-Thomas Scholarship Fund resulted from generous bequests under the wills of Sam Kidder and Jean Thomas. The sum has been invested along with subsequent donations, and the income earned from this investment is for scholarships for "worthy students who are members of Hunt's Church."

Trustees of the Fund will consider applications for scholarship aid each year. There are three trustees that oversee the fund: Co-Chairs of the Church Council (Cara Ehrlich and Nancy Kennedy), Chair of the Finance Committee (Ted Ochs), and Chair of the Board of Trustees (Lisa Lipman).

Applications must be received by June 30, 2020.

Additional applications are available at the Church Office. The completed application should be submitted along with an official transcript of high school or college grades, preferably through the spring of the current year.

Scholarships are for Hunt's congregation members who are undergraduate students enrolled full-time (12 credits or more per semester) and graduate students enrolled part-time or full time (6 credits or more per semester) in an accredited college or university in the United States.

In awarding scholarships, the Scholarship Trustees will primarily consider the applicants':

- Academic merit
- Financial need
- Church involvement and activities
- Community involvement and leadership

The total amount of scholarships available is the fund's earnings since last July. Generally, the awards have been in the range of \$250 to \$750. It is the Scholarship Trustees goal to meet and make their decisions in the month of July.

Applicants must make an annual application for each year of full time undergraduate or part or full time graduate status.




