To the sinners and saints at Hunt's Memorial UMC -



Moment in Time ... 1966

Fifty-four years ago, in the summer of 1966, a momentous change was taking place at Hunt's. After suffering Maryland's heat and humidity for over 190 years, Hunt's congregation was soon to enjoy air conditioning. The clipping included here appeared in the June 1966 church newsletter. It noted that the decision to air condition the sanctuary had been made the month before, and announced that installation was now in progress.

Only those of us who are senior citizens today truly recognize what a "halleluiah event" this must have been for many. Even now, we can remember going to church in the days before air conditioning. We sat and sweated together as large electric fans hummed, making it difficult at times to hear all that was being said. Many of us fanned ourselves with church bulletins or made use of woven straw hand-fans stored behind hymnals in each pew. These often-displayed advertising of



the commercial establishment which had graciously donated them, in many cases, the local funeral parlor. With the sanctuary being on the second floor, oh how we looked forward each Sunday to descending the stairs to the ground level which was noticeably cooler than the sanctuary above.

When looking for additional information related to the 1966 air conditioning event, I was able to get the following input from three longtime members: Susan Meyers, Ken Parrish, and Rusty Erdman.

Though not actually recalling the installation date, Ken and Rusty remembered that air conditioning was not that prevalent at the time, and that throughout the early 70's the church advertised its air conditioned sanctuary, encouraging people to worship at Hunt's in comfort. Susan, who was a graduating high school senior in 1966, explained that although she did not have any specific memory of the 1966 air conditioning installation, she did recall how at one point a small group of men, including her father, Ross Conlin, had said enough was enough with the stifling heat and joined together to donate some window AC units for the church. Window units in the lower levels of the church eventually disappeared as building improvements and additions were added in the 1970's and 80's. However, Ken pointed out there is still one window AC unit in use in the oldest part of the basement.

Note: Reverend Richard Nowers was pastor at Hunts from 1965-1969

Your financial support of Hunt's Church during the pandemic continues to be amazing. In May, for a second straight month our offering exceeded that of last year. **THANK YOU!!**

Here is our performance through the end of May:

Income in May benefited from the recognition of \$35,446 of the Federal PPP loan that was spent in a manner that will enable it to be converted to a grant and treated as income. This funding from the Federal Government was made possible through one of the COVID-19 relief pieces of legislation, the Federal CARES Act. Excluding this unusual source of funding, giving for the year so far is \$10,374 below budget. Tight management of expenses has offset the shortfall in giving and other income, with the positive difference of \$34,803 shown above attributable to the Federal PPP funds.

The Finance Committee, primarily through Rick Ehrlich's efforts, has expanded the ways to give electronically as a result of the pandemic. We added the GivePlus app (<u>https://www.vancopayments.com/egiving/church-app</u>) to our Vanco electronic platform, and now we also offer the option to give via credit card and text-to-give. Information on these two methods can be found on the church's website (<u>www.huntsumc.org</u>). We encourage you to check them out and choose the method that works best for you. Of course, we also welcome checks mailed to the church office – whatever works for you.



As regular churchgoers know, the summer months are traditionally a time when many are absent from church and, as a result, giving suffers. We hope that you will take advantage of the many ways to give now available to you to help us eliminate the summer slump this year.



Exciting News from Melissa Regan

A few people have asked me about this PA School thing I am doing. Here is a partial response!

I have been trying to figure out what I wanted to do my whole life. I tried computer programming, research, and teaching. I considered becoming a doctor, but the time it would take seemed too long. A few years ago, when my son broke his hand, I had to take him "to the doctor" every week for several weeks, and we always saw a Physician Assistant (PA)! I investigated and realized that this was the answer I had been looking for – a career that would use my background and interest in biology, allow me to keep learning every day, and give me the opportunity to help people - and school was "only" 28 months!

I am currently in the Yale PA Online Program. It is a new program, and I am in the second class along with 57 classmates from all over the country. How an online program works is a longer story, but we have all also met in person for a couple of weeks for cadaver dissections, hands-on procedures, and physical assessment practice.



My first year, all of 2019, was an intense year of classes. Now I am about to start my fifth of 15 months of clinical rotations. Required rotations are Family Practice (3 months), Internal Medicine (3 months), and Pediatrics (2 months), and Psychiatry, Surgery, Women's Health, and Emergency Medicine (each one month). We also choose three elective rotations. I plan to do one in Cardiology and am still deciding on the other two.

I just finished my Psychiatry rotation which was at a psychiatric hospital in DC. I worked primarily with adolescents. It was eye-opening to say the least, and I wish I could know how some of the kids come out in a few years. I start Internal Medicine in Olney next.

I am currently on track to graduate in June 2021. A PA in Maryland must work in a practice with a doctor, but after I pass the licensing exam, I can work in

almost any field of medicine seeing patients, making diagnoses, and deciding on treatments including writing prescriptions.

Sometimes next June seems like it will never get here, and sometimes I don't see how I will ever be ready. However, I am excited to be on this path and look forward to this continuing adventure!





I hope this finds everyone safe and well during this crazy time. Monies (\$927) have been sent to Child Fund International for the children that we help. As donations have come in, more money has been sent to the Assistance Center of Towson Churches.

In recent weeks, the Food for Thought fund has received many donations from members of our church family, to help with food for school-age children. The Student Support Network is faithfully working to assist these children and their families. Hunt's Church is donating \$1,000 (from the FFT fund) to help with this effort. There will still be enough money to fill the Food for Thought bags in the fall (when/if school resumes). – Thank you for all of your generous donations.
