To the people pursuing God with or through Hunts Memorial UMC -

Grace and peace – today we experience the teeth and the treasure of the Chinese curse: “may you live in interesting times.” Indeed, these are interesting times. Whenever we change anything, we experience a dislocation and disorientation of not knowing the lay of the land – given the new reality, what will tomorrow bring, and what can/should we do to make that tomorrow more palatable for us and those whom we love?

In times of change, it can be useful to think about what isn't changing.

In September, weather starts to cool here in Maryland, leaves will start to change color, crops will be harvested and fields will lie fallow, children will “go to” school in one form or another, and we will begin to prepare for the hard reset of the local biosphere that is the cold and dark of winter. Food is stored, buildings are battened, preparations for wind, dark, and cold are made. As a TV show made famous, “winter is coming.”

While these things remain true, much that we had assumed was as fixed and unchanging as the tides has been demonstrated to be much more fickle. Some of us are not working when we would like to be. Some of us are not visiting or traveling as we had anticipated. Some have lost loved ones to a disease that came literally out of the chaos to impact our world and our circle of friends and family. Some cannot do as they normally do in preparation for winter because their harvest has failed. For the sake of our common image bearing of God, those of us who still have a harvest, and resources, must share.


The suffering is real and undeniable. No power of government or technology can take it away. In our suffering, however, our humanity can be strengthened if we will care for one another as God asks. If we will reach out in compassion and love, the world will become a warmer, kinder place. Now is an hour of darkness. In the darkness, the light of God, the light of love, the light of compassion shine all the brighter.

*Let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works
and give glory to your Father in heaven. (Matt 5:16 NRSV)*

Shine even now, my friends, for the darkness cannot overcome the light of God.

- Canned fruit (oranges, peaches, etc.)
- Dry pasta, rice, instant potatoes (bag or box)
- Spaghetti sauce (jar or can)
- Macaroni and cheese meals (box)
- Tuna (can)
- Peanut butter, jelly (jar)
- Soup (can)
- Toiletries (deodorant, lotions, soap, shampoo, toothpaste, diapers, feminine hygiene products, etc.)

I am saddened to report that our Annual Turkey Dinner will not happen this year.

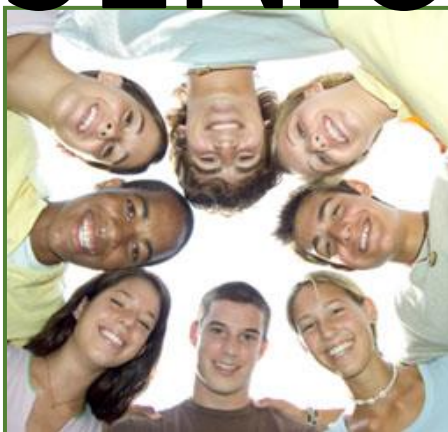
With the uncertainty of Covid-19, it seems impossible to plan for this event at this time.

2020 Baltimore County Christian Workcamp (BCCW)

Our 37th annual BCCW is history. Like so many events and activities this year by so many groups, this one too was unique and vastly different from its predecessors. There was no planning meeting, no auction, no kick-off dinner, and no orientation meeting on Sunday at Hunt's, which has been the base and host church for BCCW since 1992, for this ecumenical effort, run 100% by volunteers. There were no breakfasts and no lunch preparation during the week at Hunt's; and no dinners, including the wrap-up dinner, at other locations during the week. There were the least number of participants since probably the BCCW start-up in 1984. In addition, in order to provide safety for both the volunteers and clients, we did no work inside of any houses, only outside work, e.g., ramps, deck repair, wood fence installation.

In spite of the above, we did continue the tradition of having a BCCW, whose mission is helping those in need, albeit it was on a more limited scale this year.



During the week, seven different teams completed eight of fourteen possible outside work sites. Prior to the week, there had been work done at another nine sites, so our "annual" total (July-August) was seventeen. The number of participants who registered for the week was 41, including ten who worked on Hunt's site.

In recent years, Hunt's has elected to do two ramps, except when we decided to tackle

BCCW's record-setting 164' long ramp system in 2016; however, this year, we thought that it would be best to be responsible for just one ramp due to the unique and extenuating circumstances.



Hunt's project, located in Rosedale, south of the Beltway, included an approximate 8' x 6' landing over an existing porch and then a 28+ ramp left to the driveway. Typically, a ramp this size would be done in 1 ½ days. However, due to the forecast of high temperatures with high humidity, the threat of afternoon thunderstorms, the wearing of masks, and a goal of social distancing whenever possible, as well as a derelict van situated several feet off

the ramp alignment, we were anticipating 2 ½-3 ½ days of work. However, with no thunderstorms and a VERY shady site, and a productive team (including the late addition of two non-Hunt's members on Tuesday, but both with close "ties" to Hunt's), we were done by 2:00 pm on Tuesday.



Even though we did not physically host the BCCW, Hunt's still was an integral part of the 37th annual BCCW. We thank all who participated:

- The Missions Committee and the Church Council who approved Hunt's being the host and base for BCCW.
- Carroll's-Gill's Endowment Fund for its \$2000 donation and those members who supported the 2019 Advent and 2020 Lenten special offerings from which ½, or \$1,275, was given to BCCW.
- Those who worked on Monday and Tuesday: Glenn and Linda Keatts; Travis Knoll; Steve Lippy; and Keith, Lizzie, and Joseph Mc Millan who was a rookie this year and assisted his granddad Keith. Rounding out the team were George Garrett (BCCW's treasurer); and, on Tuesday, the two late additions of Travis' twin brothers (Colby and Gregg Knoll).
- Crew Chief Glenn who designed the ramp, traveled from Aberdeen to Frederick in order to get all of the requisite lumber and supplies, hauled the lumber, and then coordinated and oversaw the construction of the ramp.
- Howard Lin, who is the BCCW's photographer, as well as Hunt's photographer, who actually was on duty all five days.

Hopefully, 2021 will return to more of a normalcy for all of us; notwithstanding, we anticipate that there will be a 38th annual BCCW from July 19-23, 2021 and that, modified from John Wesley's admonition: we do all the good we can, by all the means we can, in all the ways we can, in all the places we can, at all the times we can, to all the people we can, as long as ever we can.

If you have any thoughts you would share on this matter, please feel free to contact Pastor Travis. Thank you.

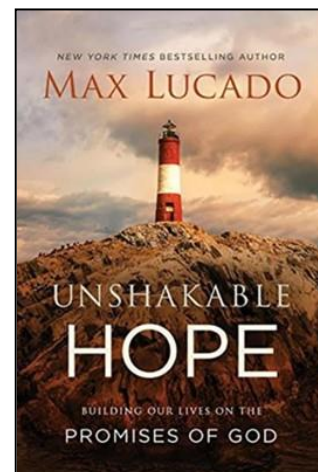
Unshakable Hope Study to start in September

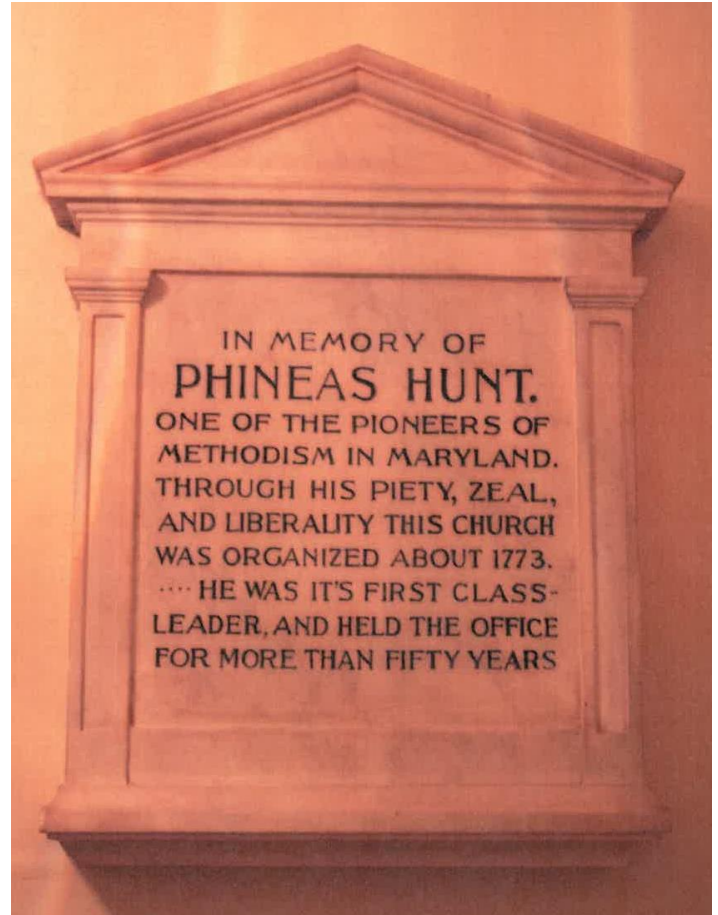


Moment in Time...1910

In 1910, a marble memorial tablet in memory of Phineas Hunt was presented to the congregation. Today, this tablet is still proudly on display. As you enter the hallway through the interior doors leading from the church vestibule, glance up high to the right and you will see this 110-year-old memorial.

In February 1910, Church services were held on both Saturday and Sunday to commemorate this memorial tablet. Special music was said to be rendered at both services by the Hunt's Church choir. The tablet was formally unveiled at the morning service on Sunday, February 6, 1910 by **Mr. William Beall Hunt**, great-great nephew of Phineas Hunt. The unveiling of the tablet marked the anniversary of the death of Phineas Hunt who had died exactly seventy-three years earlier on February 6, 1837.

The idea for the tablet had originated earlier in 1909 with **Mrs. Mary E. Hunt Wright**, the grand niece of Phineas Hunt. Mrs. Wright made the first donation toward the tablet's purchase. At the suggestion of church trustee William A. Martin, a collection was taken among the church members and over \$50 was immediately secured for the project. Later Mrs. Wright sent additional donations from other Hunt's descendants enabling the tablet to be purchased and the engraving to be made.



The tablet is said to be of fine marble costing \$100 in 1910, a sum equivalent to more than \$2700 today. It was purchased from William A. Gault & Son of Baltimore. At the time, **H. Wilson Burgan** was pastor at Hunt's Church. In Reverend Burgan's 1910 booklet, *The Story of Hunt's Methodist Episcopal Church*, he wrote about the origination and unveiling of The Hunt Memorial Tablet.
