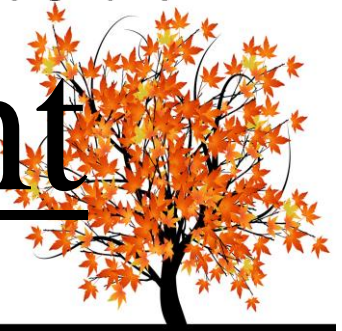

A lot of bad habits and behaviors have been buried in those apples, and they have started to corrupt the whole cart. Some of this is reflected in the very real cry for recognition and "mattering" that are visible on TVs everywhere. Some of it is smaller and much more personal, as we strive to find a place where we can stand and not have to experience condemnation. We must cut through the urgent to see the important to determine how to respond in love.

A good example is Covid and the lockdowns. Many feel that we have no choice but to lockdown to protect ourselves and especially the most vulnerable among us. The WHO, however, has recently started to lobby against such blanket lockdowns in the west because those very lockdowns are having catastrophic effects upon poorer nations who depend so heavily upon the consumption of the wealthy economies to continue to provide food for their children.

So whose needs are worthy of being counted (matter, in other words)? God has given all of humanity his image to bear. God cares about the effects of our decisions upon all of his children. Even those of Nineveh, who Jonah understands to be the enemies of God's chosen people, "who do not know their right hand from their left hand", as we learn in Jonah 4:11.

We are all doing our best to understand and act on our understandings, yet all too often we are accused of acting unlovingly and in ignorance, of doing wickedness even when an intention to cause harm isn't in our hearts. How can one live and act at all in a world like this?

What and who matter is the question.

- What (and whose) suffering matters?
- What (and whose) needs matter?
- What (and whose) efforts toward meeting those needs and addressing that suffering are worthy of recognition and emulation?

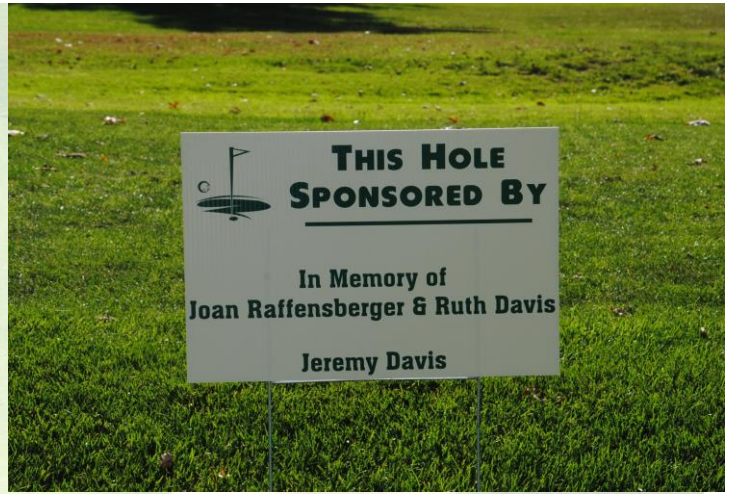

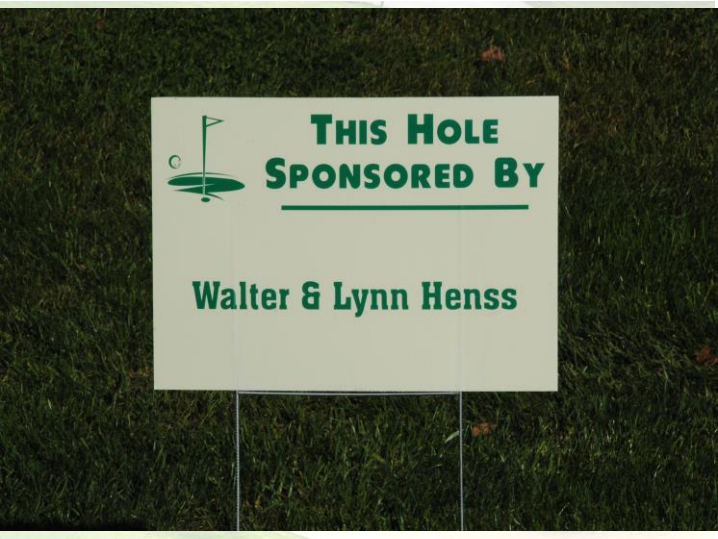

LET'S KEEP THIS MOMENTUM GOING!

Giving in September was impressive – we budgeted offering of \$12,219, but you decided to give \$19,006. That is amazing – thank you! For the year, offering is now slightly above what was budgeted (\$235,503 vs \$232,505). This development, combined with extremely tight expense management, means we are in a much better financial position than we expected to be after nine months of the year (see the table below).

Here is our performance through the end of September:

Thank you for your faithful support during these very challenging times. Many churches have struggled financially these past several months, but due to your actions, Hunt's has not been one of them. As we approach the end of the year, please continue your support so we can end as strong as possible as we know next year will also be a challenge financially. Although we budgeted to have a shortfall this year, we are optimistic we might end closer to breakeven.

I would remind you that the Finance Committee, primarily through Rick Ehrlich's efforts, has expanded the ways to give electronically as a result of the pandemic. We added the GivePlus app (<https://www.vancopayments.com/egiving/church-app>) to our Vanco electronic platform, and now we also offer the option to give via credit card and text-to-give. Information on these two methods can be found on the church's website (www.huntsumc.org). We encourage you to check them out and choose the method that works best for you. Of course, we also welcome checks mailed to the church office – whatever works for you.

What makes the results above even more impressive is that giving for Missions is also up. With so many people in our community hurting, it is nice to see that Hunt's is reaching out to help. Moment in Time...1970

Question: *What do Hunt's member Barbara Green and Phineas Hunt have in common?*

Answer: *They owned and lived in the same house. Phineas in 1772, Barbara in 1970.*



The Meeting House Luthersville, Maryland

Today this house, the core of which is thought to have been built in the 1750s, remains a private residence. Though modernized and enlarged over the years, its original 270-year-old section is intact. The home is located off of West Joppa Road just a short distance from Hunt's Church. The Hunt family cemetery, to which the Church maintains a right-of-way, is located on the property. From 1773-1790, Phineas Hunt hosted a Methodist class at his home, explaining the historical references to the home as "The Meeting House".

Prior to purchasing the "Phineas Hunt Home", Barbara and her husband Jim, and their four children lived in the Roland Park area of Baltimore City. In a recent interview, Barbara said by the time her youngest child was born she was eager to move to more open spaces. She went on to explain that she and her husband had started playing bridge with a couple who lived next door to this historic Baltimore County property. She remembers every time they drove past, she'd say, "I'd like to live it that house someday." And as luck would have it, in 1970 it came up for sale.

The home and neighborhood turned out to be everything Barbara had hoped it would be. The roomy house, spacious grounds, swimming pool, and welcoming neighbors made it a wonderful place to raise a family. Barbara said some of her most memorable times were spent in this lovely old home. She and her husband lived here until it was time to downsize as their children were growing up and going off to school. At that point they moved to a townhome off of Old Court Road, and then later to the condominium in Timonium, where Barbara currently resides.

In addition to finding her dream home in 1970, Barbara and her family began a longtime relationship with nearby Hunt's Church. A friend had made Barbara aware of Hunt's even before her family moved into the area, and after giving it a try and finding it a great fit, the Church became an integral part of their lives.

Though Hunt's today is fortunate to have many long-term members, Barbara is the only one who can say she has lived in the home of the congregation's progenitor or been the custodian of the Hunt family graveyard. Barbara said it was always interesting to tell people about the Hunt's connection, the cemetery on their property, and how the right-of-way to it was a part of their property deed. Also she said many, especially her own children, were always interested in the small door adjacent to the sitting room fireplace that was said to have been for the moving in and out of coffins during funerals in years past.

Historic Note: The Hunt's home stands on a part of a colonial era land tract called "Beall's Discovery". This tract sold for 600 pounds of tobacco to Thomas Crossing in 1703. By 1730 the land transferred to Walter Smith, and then on to his son Walter Smith Jr. In his will dated 1770, Walter Smith Jr. left "Beall's Discovery" along with two other area land tracts to his half-brothers, Job, Phineas, and Samuel Hunt. (Their mother, Elizabeth Chew, was married first to Walter Smith Sr. who died in 1743; second to Job Hunt who died in 1753; and third to James Bond, marrying circa 1772. Approaching her 3rd marriage, Elizabeth transferred her own part of "Beall's Discovery" and other inherited holdings to her three sons.)

MONDAWMIN MISSION

- This summer, we supported The Baer School using a grant from Carroll's-Gill's Permanent Endowment Fund. This was \$13,000 to assist their teachers with classroom supplies, engage students, and assist families that desperately needed basic supplies such as diapers, food, and hygiene items. These are families trying their best to get by with severely disabled children in what was an incredibly difficult situation before Covid hit.
- We also assisted a young man and his family with some gift cards and also counseling him concerning college courses. We got him off to his sophomore year at the University of Charleston in West Virginia.
- Working to assist the Izzy Craig Scholarship Fund and our scholarship committee, we were able to identify five worthy candidates, and to award scholarships totaling \$4,000. These candidates were required to write an essay and are now in their fall semester at five different colleges.
- Some funds were also donated to the Frederick Douglas High School to upgrade a concession stand and press box at the school's football field in West Baltimore.
- Harriett Schwarzkopf donated a couple bicycles, and we provided helmets to two very appreciative 8 & 9-year-old girls in West Baltimore.
- Going forward, I think the best thing we can do is to identify needy families really hit hard by Covid, continue to work with the Baer School, and to bring forward needs as they appear. There is never a shortage of need in the City.

ACTC THANKSGIVING BAGS

- It's time again this year to help families in our community with donations of food for Thanksgiving. Last year ACTC distributed bags of food to almost 2,500 families, including more than 100 bags from Hunt's. They hope to serve even more of our neighbors this year.
- Given reduced attendance at Sunday Services and risks associated with COVID-19, you may prefer to give a monetary donation to ACTC this year. A donation of \$25 will cover the cost of a bag of food. Please designate "Thanksgiving Bags" on your check or your electronic gift sent to Hunt's by 11/9. ACTC will use these donations to purchase bulk foods and prepare the Thanksgiving bags they will distribute.

- If you would like to provide bags of food rather than (or in addition to) a monetary donation, there are a couple options:
 - you can bring bags to Hunt's on Sunday 11/15 between 9:30am and 11am and drop them off in the designated area outside (regardless of whether you have signed up to attend worship)
 - you can make an appointment with the McMillans (dmc6366@aol.com or 410-916-0892) to pick up your bags for delivery to ACTC
- Below is a list of the items that should be included in each bag if you want to shop for yourself (some families prefer this as a hands-on service opportunity).

**Please include ONLY the following items in each basket:
(All additional items should be in separate bags and marked "MISCELLANEOUS")**

- 1 can sweet potatoes/yams (23-29 oz can)
- 2 cans meat/main dish (example: beef stew or chili-15-24 oz cans)
- 1 large can fruit (20-30 oz can)
- 4 cans vegetables (example: green beans, peas or corn-15 oz cans)
- 1 cranberry sauce
- 2 pkg. macaroni & cheese
- 1 box instant mashed potatoes (13.3 or 13.75 oz.)
- 1 cake or brownie mix
- 1 bag or box of stuffing mix
- 1 lb. bag or box of rice (28 oz.)

****PLEASE DO NOT PUT MONEY OR GIFT CARDS IN BAGS.**

TIPS FOR PACKING:

1. Pack large cans on bottom & lighter items on top.
2. If possible, use a Reusable Grocery Bag /**OR** a double brown grocery bag inserted in double plastic bag.
3. Mark bags as **COMPLETE** or **INCOMPLETE** (list what is missing).



OR

You will have the opportunity to purchase pre-packed Thanksgiving Baskets from several supermarkets in the area for a reasonable price. This year we have 4 grocery stores participating in the ACTC Thanksgiving Drive. All bags will be packed in advance at each of the stores listed and can be picked up at the Customer Service counter for (See Below). This also includes a re-usable bag. If you are picking up multiple bags, please call in advance.

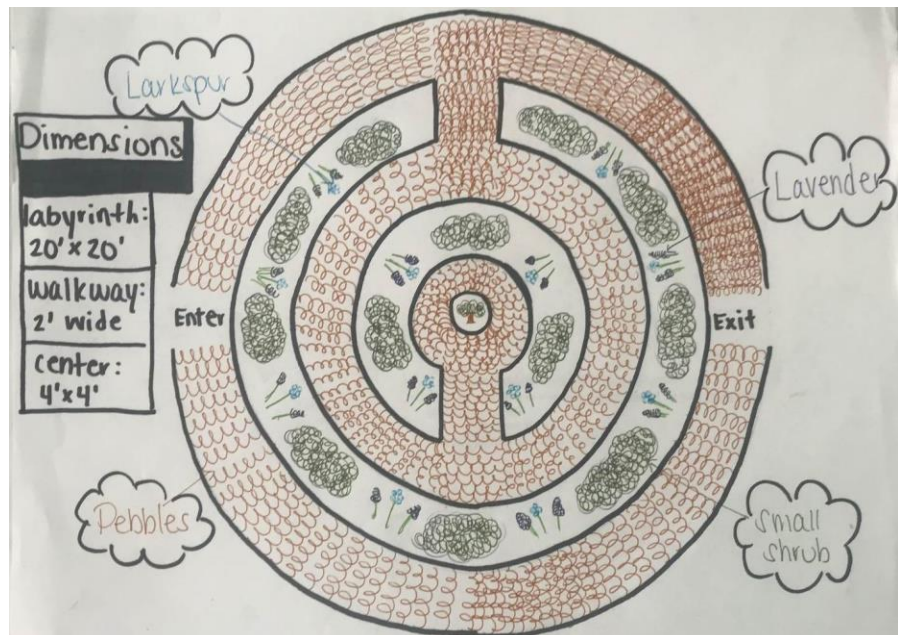
From Sabina Smith:

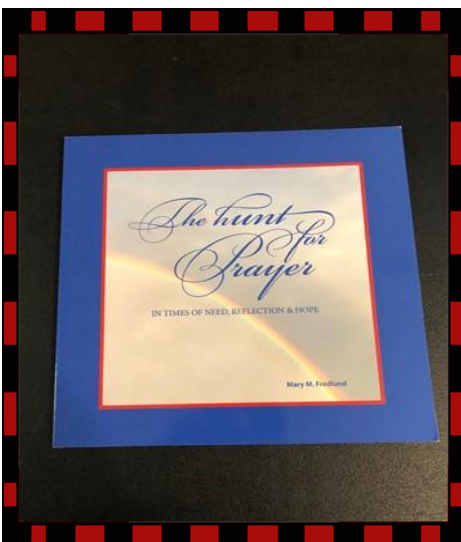
Guess what????????? ---- She did!!!!!!!

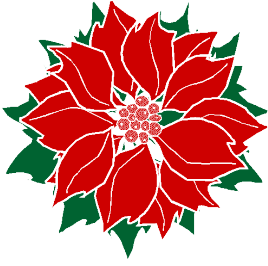

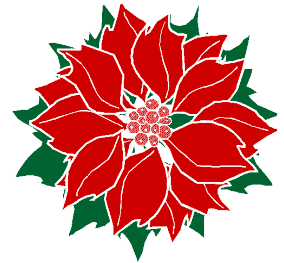

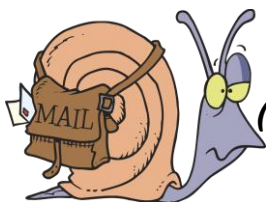

BALTIMORE COUNTY CHRISTIAN WORKCAMP

JULY 18 - 23, 2021



We are hoping to conduct a full version of the Workcamp as has been done from the beginning (except in 2020). However, we will also be prepared to hold it in a modified version, as was done in 2020, if health precautions again require that we do so.

The 37th Workcamp was conducted this past July, in a limited and greatly modified format due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Work was performed only on outside projects, following prescribed health and safety precautions. To avoid large gatherings, no meetings were held (other than virtually) or meals served, or silent auction conducted.

Despite the restrictions, a hearty group of about 40 volunteers were able to assist eight families in Baltimore County. As often is the case, it was one of the hottest weeks of the summer. And it was surprisingly difficult to obtain treated lumber for some of our projects due to shortages resulting from pandemic related staffing problems at the mills.

As always, several volunteers attempted to work one day a week on smaller projects during the rest of the year. Starting in February, their efforts were greatly restricted due to the pandemic. Yet, they still were able to perform work at nine additional homes.

Thus, the Workcamp completed projects at 17 homes between August 2019, and the end of July 2020.
