## Hunt's Memorial United Methodist Church



Grace and peace, brothers and sisters:

In Bishop Laurie Haller's response to the two recent mass shootings (included in this newsletter in full), we hear her say this: "In the United States, we assume safety and comfort. It is unimaginable to think that going about our lives each day could be dangerous." Both the mathematician and the realist within me bristle at this.

Life is not safe. Accidents, injuries, carelessness, illness, and a variety of maladies intended, incidental, and random happen that run the gamut from silly to unavoidable. Lightning kills on average 20 Americans every year. Heart Attack and heart failure kill 600,000 or more. To demand of this world safety is to refuse to accept reality.

Nobody gets out of here alive, at least until Jesus comes. While I am as willing as the next guy to skip the whole dying thing, why should I be so lucky? Who knows when the Lord will return – until he actually does, to (mis?) quote a Marvel Superhero "let's assume that the world will go on spinning until it stops." An unreasonable fear of death will not stop its arrival, it will only diminish our ability to live the time we do have.

Don't get me wrong, I am not saying we should ignore risks -a "healthy" fear of death can keep us from doing spectacularly dumb things to hasten its arrival...

This is where the balancing begins. How afraid to live should we be? This year has given us lots of time and opportunity to think about this. We need to value our lives. We need to live them, too.

It is spring, and the world we live in is waking up from its winter slumber. Flowers dare to show their glory: the crocus, daffodils, and even tulips are starting to lift their beautiful heads, in spite of the fact that a late frost is still a very real possibility. Yet without sun, growth, risk, and life, the bulbs will die and rot. Dare to live.

That requires courage. The monsters are real, sometimes, though we can make mountains out of molehills, as my mother used to say. Still, there are indeed real monsters out there, some of them named Covid, and some of them the result of "horrific violence", as Bishop Haller said.



#### **Double-Check those Doors!**





#### Moment in Time...1888

On July 11, 1888, during the pastorate of Rev. Edward T. Mowbray, Hunt's Methodist Episcopal Church was incorporated. A copy of the original incorporation agreement is kept on file in the church records. The trustees noted at the time were: *Lewis J. Roberts; \*Thomas Wright; Edward Rider; George B. Roberts; and Daniel W. Chipman.* Two months later, on September 12, 1888, Hunt's trustees purchased the narrow strip of land bordering the church property on the east side. This purchase added enough land to build a parsonage in 1912, and to allow future generations to enlarge the church building, adding on a kitchen, fellowship space, and educational classrooms.

The east lot was obtained for \$150.00 dollars from the trustee of the estate of Mrs. Ella V. Davis, deceased. The money for this extra land was donated to the church by then member and trustee, Thomas Wright who was the president of the Bleach & Dye Works at Rockland. Mr. Wright was deeply interested in the work of the church and gave liberally of his time and money to various church enterprises. At the time of his death, he bequeathed \$2,500 in bonds to the church. He requested that the income from the bonds be used to pay the pastor's salary, or that proceeds from the sale of the bonds be used to build a parsonage. (The value of \$150 in 1888 is approximately \$4,000 today. The \$2500 bequest in 1888 is approximately \$70,000 today)

When Phineas Hunt died in 1837, much of his property was left to his nephew, Jesse Hunt. In 1874, Mrs. Ella V. Davis purchased a large tract of land (including the east lot later to be purchased by Hunt's Church) from a second Jesse Hunt, who appears to be Phineas' great nephew who had inherited the property from his father in 1872. During this time period, the tract of land became known as *Ellenham Farms*, most likely in honor of its owner, Ella Davis. A section of it, later renamed *Ellenham Park*, became part of modern day Ruxton's early housing development in the 1890's. Local papers at the time reported on the progress of the *Ellenham Park* development whose street plan, laid out in 1882 by surveyor W. H. Shipley, was said to incorporate curved roadways dotted with beautiful homes often designed by well-known local architects of the day. The names *Ellenham Farms* and *Ellenham Park* are still in use today designating residential sections in the Ruxton-Riderwood area.



**Ellenham Avenue**, just down the hill from Hunt's Church, and its intersecting street, **Ellenham Road**, are present day reminders of these bygone days in the late 1800's. For those of us who have tried to envision the Greenspring Valley land holdings of Phineas Hunt, this current research adds another piece to the puzzle.

\***Note**: Hunt's stained-glass window dedicated to <u>Thomas Wright 1811-1900 and</u> <u>Mary Wright 1813-1896</u> was presented by their descendants, Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Wright, as part of the church's restoration following the destructive 1933 fire.

While the income for the first two months is strong, we can't forget it is largely due to some donations of stock we received in January. As this was anticipated when developing the budget, you can see that we are actually running behind our plan in terms of income. That being said, we are holding up remarkably well during the pandemic. Our giving so far this year is only slightly lower than last year at this time (and this was pre-pandemic), so thank you for continuing to financially supporting our church.

Our expenses are running above budget, but this is due to some unexpected facility surprises – a major water leak, boiler problems, other plumbing issues, and snow removal. At this point, we are not concerned with the expenses since these are not likely to recur (at least, we hope they don't!). I would be remiss if I didn't acknowledge the many volunteer hours by the Trustees that minimize our facility expenses – what an awesome group – thank you!

While I encourage you to continue being faithful in your giving, I would also ask you to continue praying for us as a congregation, all of the missions and programs we provide to our members and the broader community, and for the church council as it tries to guide us through these challenging times. Our church has emerged strong from other trying times in its 248-year history, and we can do the same now.



The United Methodist Church From the Office of Bishop Laurie Haller

In response to the recent shootings that killed eight people, including six Asian-Americans, in Atlanta and ten people in Boulder, Bishop Laurie released the following pastoral letter to Dakotas and Iowa United Methodists.

My heart echoes the psalmist's cry: "O God, do not keep silence; do not hold your peace or be still, O God!" (*Psalm 83:1, NRSV*)

Today, I grieve the horrific violence of the <u>shootings in Atlanta, Georgia</u>, at three spas and a <u>grocery store in Boulder</u>, <u>Colorado</u>. In these communities, 18 people died at the hands of two shooters, both 21 years of age.

In the United States, we assume safety and comfort. It is unimaginable to think that going about our lives each day could be dangerous.

The only place we can turn is to the One who is always faithful. So, the refrain to my lament is: "Great is thy faithfulness! Great is thy faithfulness! Morning by morning new mercies I see; all I have needed thy hand has provided; great is thy faithfulness, Lord, unto me!" (*United Methodist Hymnal* #140)

God remains God amid the violent chaos. And God's saving, reconciling narrative remains unwavering in the midst of hopelessness and despair.

I urge you to turn to God in prayer. Pray for all those who suffer as a result of these violent and terror-inducing acts. Pray that God will comfort the families and friends of the victims, especially our Asian-American brothers and sisters who are grieving in Atlanta. Pray for the first responders and those, including the police, who work to protect public safety. Pray for all those feeling vulnerable, isolated, insecure, and fearful. Pray for peace.

Soon we will celebrate the resurrection of Jesus. Easter Sunday is the story of the risen Christ coming to his bewildered and frightened disciples. Easter is about the resurrected Jesus reaching out to us across the vast, dark abysses of despair, doubt, and death and saying, "Peace be with you."

Peace is a collective responsibility that begins with each of us examining our hearts. Jesus calls each of us to "love your neighbor." It is clear that this spiritual imperative means all neighbors without regard to race, color, religion, or national origin.

Paul taught that "enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions and factions" are among many works of the flesh that are antithetical to the kingdom of God. "By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control." (*Galatians 5: 19-23, NRSV*) These works of the Spirit lead to peace-making and the kingdom of God.

The recent shootings leave us perplexed with our world. Friends, please know this: that God is with us. We are called to follow the example of Jesus as the peacemaker.

"Let there be peace on earth and let it begin with me; let there be peace on earth, the peace that was meant to be. With God our creator, children all are we. Let us walk with each other in perfect harmony." (*United Methodist Hymnal #431*)
